CALL TO ORDER

Friday Afternoon, June 26, 2015 First Plenary Session

1. GENERAL SYNOD CALL TO ORDER

Moderator, Mr. Brian Holeman (CAC, S) called the first business session of the Thirtieth General Synod to order at 2:30 PM and welcomed delegates, visitors and guests. In addition to the Welcome, Mr. Holeman recognized the significance of the day with the affirmation of the Supreme Court of the United States' ruling in favor of extending the right to marry to same gender couples in all 50 states. He recognized Mr. Black, the General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ, and called on him to comment on this important milestone.

2. COMMENTS REGARDING SUPREME COURT RULING.

Mr. Black indicated that this is a bright moment in the mission and ministry of the United Church of Christ. Mr. Black pointed out that this has not been an easy journey but that the decision represents the full expression of justice to all. He asked that we hold on to the idea that all things are possible for even more things that seem impossible today.

3. WELCOME FROM THE HOST CONFERENCE

Mr. Holeman noted the extravagant hospitality of Local Arrangements Committees of each General Synod that work throughout the biennium preparing for delegates, honored guests and visitors. He introduced Mr. Phil Hart, Conference Minister for the Ohio Conference and invited him to the podium. Mr. Hart extended a warm welcome on behalf of the host conference.

4. WELCOME FROM THE CLEVELAND MAYOR

Mr. Holeman introduced the Honorable Frank G. Jackson. Mr. Jackson welcomed everyone to Cleveland and thanked the United Church of Christ for bringing Synod to Cleveland. He extended an open invitation to take advantage of all Cleveland has to offer and to return as often as possible. He thanked the Church for being on the forefront of Justice and Equality, and for being on the forefront of promoting and defining Justice and Equality.

5. INTRODUCTION OF GENERAL SYNOD LEADERSHIP

Mr. Holeman introduced Assistant Moderator, Ms. Sue Artt (RM, S).

Mr. Holeman also introduced the Parliamentarians, Ms. Denise Page Hood (MICH), Federal District Judge, serving as the Parliamentarian for the Moderators and Ms. Libby Tigner (CA, NV, S) serving as the delegates' Parliamentarian.

Ms. Hood and Ms. Tigner reminded the delegates of applicable procedural rules and of the role of the Youth Stewards.

Mr. Holeman introduced Mr. Corey Larson, the Agenda Coordinator. Mr. Holeman explained the committee process, including the composition and role of the Agenda Committee.

Mr. Holeman introduced Mr. Lee Foley, Administrator of the General Synod, and Mr. David Anderson, head of the Committee Process Team. Mr. Holeman explained that the Agenda Committee consists of the Synod Administrator, the Moderators, the Parliamentarians, the Chair of the Committee on Disposition, the Agenda Coordinator and the head of the Committee Process Team.

6. REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Mr. Holeman called on Ms. Carol Burke (Ohio), Chair of the Credentials Committee, who moved the adoption of the Report of the Credentials Committee (Appendix A). She reported that the number of delegates under the age of thirty in the delegation as a whole exceeds the target number for that category of delegates and that this General Synod is in compliance with the diversity requirements of the bylaws. Ms. Burke recommends that, for future Synods, data regarding cultural and ethnic categories, gathered through Synod registration, should be reflexive of the analytics. Moreover, she suggested that we raise the diversity level from 17% to 20%

15-GS-1 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the report of the Credentials Committee by consensus.

7. QUORUM DECLARED

Mr. Holeman called upon Ms. Burke for the report of the Credentials Committee with regard to the Thirtieth General Synod attendees. Ms. Burke reported that there were 737 delegates in attendance, out of 2991 total attendees.

Mr. Holeman declared a quorum was present and the Thirtieth General Synod was in compliance with the Constitution of the United Church of Christ and Bylaws' paragraphs 189, 190, 191 and 192. He further declared that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ is officially in session.

8. INTRODUCTION OF MICROPHONE PROCEDURES AND ELECTRONIC VOTING

Mr. Holeman explained the use of microphones and introduced the Youth Stewards. He then introduced Ms. Libby Tigner who provided instructions to the delegates on the use of the voting devices.

9. ADOPTION OF THE GENERAL SYNOD AGENDA

Mr. Holeman informed the delegation that Bylaw 227 states that the Board of Directors acts as the General Synod "ad interim". It serves as the Business Committee and Committee of Reference of the General Synod during its sessions, and as such shall prepare the agenda for General Synod and recommend changes therein during sessions.

Mr. Holeman called on Mr. Bernard Wilson, Chair of the Board of Directors, who moved the adoption of the Agenda for the Thirtieth General Synod as included in the second Report of the Board of Directors (Appendix B), and authorization for the Agenda Committee to make any necessary adjustments during sessions.

15-GS-2 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the agenda as included in the second Report of the Board of Directors and authorizes the Agenda Committee to make any necessary adjustments.

10. ADOPTION OF THE STANDING RULES

Mr. Holeman called on Mr. Wilson, who moved the adoption of the Standing Rules of the Thirtieth General Synod included in the second Report of the Board of Directors. The Standing Rules were adopted by the Board of Directors in October 2013 and posted so that all the deadlines, specifications, and other matters governing the submission of Synod business could be followed in the months leading up to Synod.

15-GS-03 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the Standing Rules.

11. GRANTING VOICE WITHOUT VOTE TO RESOURCE PERSONS

Mr. Wilson moved to grant voice without vote to resource persons who aare approved by the Business Committee and who will be asked to make reports and speak to certain issues. The office of the Administrator of the General Synod prepared a list of these people.

15-GS-04 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod grants to resource persons approved by the Business Committee, by consensus, voice without vote.

12. GRANTING VOICE WITHOUT VOTE TO DESIGNATED GROUPS

Mr. Wilson moved that the Thirtieth General Synod grant voice without vote to the designated groups and to their stated representatives who were approved by the Board of Directors and included in the

Synod Program Guide. The groups are as follows: The Ministry for God's Animals, the Faithful and Welcoming Churches of the United Church of Christ and the Association of United Church Educators.

15-GS-05 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod grants to the designated groups and to their stated representatives who were approved by the Board of Directors, by consensus, voice without vote.

13. FIRST REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Mr. Holeman called on Ms. Angela Meyers (SC), Chair of the General Synod Nominating Committee, to present the first Report of the Nominating Committee (Appendix C).

Ms. Meyers submitted the first Report of the Nominating Committee and the second Report of the Nominating Committee (Appendix D) and urged the election of the outstanding nominees presented in the two reports. She indicated that the Nominating Committee proudly endorses these members of the UCC and the process by which they were selected. She stated that, for the first time, the committee asked for professional and personal references from each candidate and a member of the Committee personally checked the references for each nominee.

Mr. Holeman received the reports without objection and advised that elections will be held on Monday.

14. INITIAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS INCLUDING INTRODUCTION OF SLATE FOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Mr. Holeman invited Mr. Wilson, Chair of the Board of Directors, to present the first Report of the Board of Directors (Appendix E) and to give a recap of the work of the Board during its first biennium.

Mr. Wilson related that he has had the great honor to serve as the very first Chair of the now 2-year old United Church of Christ Board, born of the governance restructure adopted by Synod in 2011. It has been a pleasure to work with the other members of the Board, including the Officers of the Church and your Moderator and Assistant Moderator for these past two years.

According to Mr. Wilson, the Board, working with the Officers, has put in place a sound fiscal plan, a plan for fiscal stability. Gone are the days of spending beyond our means at the National Setting. In addition, the Board oversaw the search process for the nominee being presented to you for call by election as the next General Minister and President, the Mr. John C. Dorhauer.

Mr. Wilson moved the receipt of the Board's slate of nominees for election to the General Synod Nominating Committee Class of 2021and urged the election, later in the meeting, of the four individuals placed before Synod. The names and biographies of the nominees are attached. (Appendix F)

15–GS-06: The Thirtieth General Synod approves the slate of nominees for election to the General Synod Nominating Committee Class of 2021.

Mr. Holeman cited the Standing Rules that provide for floor nominations for these positions. Hearing no nominations from the floor, he advised that nominations for at-large candidates for the Thirtieth General Synod Nominating Committee are now closed and the election will be held Monday afternoon.

15. THANK YOU TO MR. BERNARD WILSON.

Mr. Holeman thanked Mr. Wilson for his exemplary service to the church.

Mr. Holeman expressed heartfelt gratitude to Mr. Wilson for his service as a courageous and capable leader and pointed out his gifts and talents as the outgoing Chair of the United Church of Christ Board and his impact as chair of the Committee of Restructure and the vice chair of the Executive Council. Mr. Holeman also pointed out the commitment and sacrifices made by Mr. Wilson, his congregation and his family, and gave thanks for Mr. Wilson's leadership.

<u>16. CONTINUATION OF THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS –</u> <u>COMMITTEE ON DISPOSITION REPORT.</u>

Mr. Holeman called on Mr. Geoff Brace, Member of the Board of Directors' Committee of Reference, for a report. Mr. Brace reported that printed recommendations appear in two places. The first report, concerning 16 proposed resolutions that were received by the January deadline, was posted on the General Synod section of the UCC website two weeks ago for delegate review.

Mr. Brace stated that the committee received a total of seventeen (17) proposed resolutions and the Committee was recommending designating two (2) of them as "Prudential Resolutions," each requiring a majority vote, and fifteen (15) of them as "Resolutions of Witness," each requiring a two-thirds vote. The Committee was further recommending that thirteen (13) of the resolutions be referred to committees of the General Synod, three (3) of the resolutions be referred directly to a plenary session, and one of the resolutions be sent to implementing or other bodies.

15–GS-07 The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the Report of the Committee on Disposition and delegates to the Business Committee the referral of new business submitted during the first plenary of this General Synod.

17. INTRODUCTION OF NEW BUSINESS (BY TITLE ONLY)

Moderator Holeman stated that, in accordance with the Standing Rules adopted earlier in the Plenary, this is the only time in the Agenda when Delegates may introduce New Business and this New Business will be introduced by Title Only.

New Business:

1. Jeremy Rutledge (SE) Seconded by Marvin Morgan (SE), Carol Moss (SE) and Irwin Milton (SE). Title of New Business: A Just and Compassionate response to the shootings at the Mother Emmanuel AME Church in Charleston, SC.

Moderator Holeman referred the new business to the Business Committee for recommended action.

18. NOMINATION AND SPEECH OF GMP CANDIDATE

Moderator Holeman introduced Ms. Traci Blackmon and Mr. Damond Jackson to formally place the name of Mr. John C. Dorhauer into nomination before the body.

<u>19. NOMINATION AND SPEECH OF GENERAL MINISTER AND PRESIDENT</u> <u>CANDIDATE.</u>

Nomination made by Ms. Blackmon and Mr. Jackson of Mr. Dorhauer for election as General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ.

Mr. Dorhauer accepted the nomination, thanked Ms. Blackmon and Mr. Jackson and issued two challenges for the body in his speech: Have a willingness to be adaptive and formative in the face of change and have a time of deep reflection; engage in sincere and deep conversations on White Supremacy so that we can realize a community of shalom. He warned the body to prepare to fail, thus giving ourselves permission to take risks, to work together to clarify and define the mission, to fulfill the mission with passion and zeal, and to toil in love.

20. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mr. Holeman called on Administrator of the General Synod, Mr. Lee Foley for announcements.

for a well-deserved tribute and personal thanks for the financial skills and distinctive leadership he brought to the Pension Board. Mr. Carwile presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Mr. Downs.

Ms. Artt thanked Mr. Carwile and Mr. Engle for their comments. Ms. Artt declared that the Certificate of Appreciation is adopted and would be incorporated into the Minutes of the Thirtieth General Synod.

Mr. Mike Downs accepted the Certificate and thanked those present for their contribution to his ministry.

4. RE-NOMINATION AND SPEECH OF WCM CANDIDATE

Ms. Artt introduced Ms. Bonds, Chair of the Committee of Re-Nomination of Mr. James Moos to Wider Church Ministries. Ms. Bonds introduced Mr. Moos, current Executive Minister of Wider Church Ministries and candidate for re-nomination to another term.

Mr. Moos spoke on the theme of "Unexpected Places"; they are places of unexpected grace and we must tap into the source of grace and joy by sharing in the struggle for God's peace and justice. In those places we as a church would encounter the resurrection hope of new life and new community.

Ms. Artt thanked Mr. Moos for his thoughtful and challenging message and indicated that the nomination of Mr. Moos was before the General Synod and the election would be held on Monday evening.

Mr. Holeman called the Third Plenary Session to order at 8:46 AM.

Mr. Holeman thanked the participants and advised that the next Speak Out would be on Monday morning.

3. CELEBRATION OF NEW AND RENEWING CONGREGATIONS

Mr. Holeman called on Mr. J. Bennett Guess, Executive Minister of Local Church Ministries, and Mr. David Schoen, Team Leader of Congregational Assessment, Support and Advance, to lead the celebration of new congregations.

Mr. Schoen reported that since the last General Synod, the United Church of Christ has welcomed sixty seven (67) new churches. Mr. Guess introduced members from some of the new, renewing and affiliating churches.

Mr. Guess praised these new pastors and new congregations and asked the body to join in extending an extravagant welcome.

He gave thanks to his predecessors, Mr. Steve Sterner and Mr. Joe Malayang, and gave a great UCC thank you to Mr. Schoen who will retire at year's end. Mr. Guess also indicated that \$370,000 has been committed to campaign for matching offering monies for new churches to access dollars locally. He introduced the website for Just and Generous Christianity which is www.WoodToTheFire.org.

Mr. Holeman called on Ms. Elizabeth Dilley, Minister for Ministers in Local Churches in the Ministerial Excellence, Support and Authorization Ministry Team, and Ms. Bernice Powell Jackson, Pastor of First United Church of Tampa and previous Executive Minister of Justice and Witness Ministries.

Ms. Dilley Ms. Powell-Jackson announced the launch of the Antoinette Brown Society, dedicated to the advancement of women and indicated that this Synod marks the 40th anniversary of the Antoinette Brown Award. The following awardees were introduced: Ms. Sharon Ellis Davis, Founding Pastor of God Can Ministries in Chicago; Ms. Blackmon, bi-vocational minister at Christ the King United Church of Christ in Florissant, Missouri; and RevGalBlogPals, an online community of clergy women bloggers and a multi-national denominational ministry that supports, encourages and amplifies clergy women through on-line resources and in-person continuing education events. The RevGalBlogPals award was accepted by Ms. Martha Spong.

5. KEYNOTE PRESENTATION

Mr. Holeman called on Mr. Guess, Executive Minister of Local Church Ministries to introduce the First Keynote speaker, Ms. Connie Schultz, a columnist for the Washington Post and other publications. She represents those marginalized by injustice, claims the UCC as her church and is married to US Senator Sherod Brown. Ms. Schultz challenged the members of the body to share their stories to help others. She encouraged self-awareness and urged everyone to commit acts of gentle space for ourselves.

Ms. Artt thanked Ms. Schultz for her presentation.

6. RECOGNITION OF NORTH CAROLINA LITIGATION/SUPREME COURT DECISION/ANNIVERSARY OF BECOMING OPEN AND AFFIRMING

Ms. Artt invited the Thirtieth General Synod into a time of reflection and celebration of the North Carolina litigation/Supreme Court Decision/Anniversary of Becoming Open and Affirming.

Those individuals involved with the litigation were Mr. Andy Lang, Executive Director of Open and Affirming Coalition of the United Church of Christ, Mr. Mike Schuenemeyer, Mr. Don Clark, General Counsel of the United Church of Christ, Ms. Heather Kimmel, Associate General Counsel of the United Church of Christ; Mr. Edward Davis, Southern Council and the congregations of North Carolina and Eastern Virginia. Ms. Nancy Ellett Allison, Ms. Lisa Cloninger, Ms. Kathleen Smith, Mr. Nathan King, Ms. Sharon Bragan, Ms. Diane Ansley, and Mr. Joe Hoffman all spoke on the historical decisions for gay and lesbian couples.

7. COLLEGIUM TIME

Ms. Artt introduced the Officers of the Church: General Minister and President Mr. Geoffrey Black, Local Church Ministries Executive Minister Mr. Guess, Justice and Witness Ministries Executive Minister Ms. Linda Jaramillo, and Wider Church Ministries Executive Minister, Mr. Moos. Each Officer provided insights on the last two years and shared hopes for the future of the United Church of Christ.

Ms. Artt thanked the Collegium members for their remarkable work under difficult circumstances.

The Collegium received a standing ovation from the General Synod.

8. THEOLOGICAL REFLECTIONS

Ms. Artt welcomed the second of our three Theological Reflectors, Mr. Robert Molsberry. Mr. Molsberry is the Interim Pastor at Peace United Church of Christ in Webster Groves, Missouri.

9. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Ms. Artt called on Mr. Foley, for announcements.

Sunday, June 28, 2015

COMMITTEES OF THE GENERAL SYNOD

General Synod committees were in session in the morning and early afternoon, recommending on the disposition of resolutions brought before Synod.

WORSHIP

The sermon at the afternoon worship was given by Bishop Dwayne Royster, Senior Pastor and Founder of Living Water United Church of Christ, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Bishop Royster brought a message calling for us to do ministry in this unexpected time and place that will change the world through preparation, worship, miracles and resurrection.

HEARINGS

Hearings on the budget, the Nominating Committee process, relationship with the United Church of Canada, revisions to the Constitution and Bylaws, and the 2013 Resolution on Fossil Fuel took place in the evening.

Monday Morning, June 29, 2015 Fourth Plenary Session

1. CALL TO ORDER

Ms. Artt called the Fourth Plenary Session to order at 8:00 AM.

2. SPEAKOUTS!

Ms. Artt recognized the following Speak Out Participants:

Ms. Artt thanked everyone and reminded participants that the next Speak Out will be at the beginning of the next Plenary and sign-ups will be immediately following this plenary session.

3. BUDGET PRESENTATION AND VOTE

Ms. Artt introduced Ms. Kathy Houston, Chief Financial Officer of the United Church of Christ, who presented a historical financial snapshot and projections. (Appendix G)

Questions from the floor: Ms. Paula Disouri (MOMS) – Why not vote on the actual budget projection, and not just the lump sum?

Answer: Ms. Houston - The covenanted ministries and UCC Board of Directors are responsible for their own budgets. Historically, the main concentration has been on the National Basic Support level.

Ms. Artt called on Ms. Joyce Bathke, Chair of the Finance and Budget Committee of the Board of Directors. Ms. Bathke moved that the General Synod adopt a National Basic Allocation base of \$6,007 million per year and \$5,785 million for the budget years 2016 and 2017.

15-GS-11 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the National Basic Support Allocation base of \$6,007 million and \$5,785 million, respectively, for the budget years 2016 and 2017.

Ms. Bathke then moved, on behalf of the Board of Directors, that the General Synod delegate the determination of the percentage allocation for Our Churches Wider Mission National Basic Support for the 2014-2015 Biennium to the United Church of Christ Board. She then spoke to the motion.

15-GS-12 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod delegates the determination of the percentage allocation for Our Church Wider Mission National Basic Support for the budget years 2016 and 2017 to the United Church of Christ Board.

<u>4. KEYNOTE PRESENTATION</u>

Ms. Artt introduced Mr. Paul Brandeis Raushenbush, an ordained American Baptist minister and the Executive Editor of Global Spirituality and Religion for the Huffington Post. Mr. Rauschenbusch concluded his message by indicating that God's Church can be identified by being a safe space and a place for justice. We are to be a people filled with passion for justice and love and to represent God in the world at this crucial place in history in the U.S. and globally. He invited everyone to get a Twitter account.

5. VOTING/CLICKER CHANGES

Mr. Foley indicated that until a resolution could be reached with regard to the "clickers" general votes would be by voice vote.

Mr. Jorge Morale, Conference Minister (ILL Conference), requested that written ballots be used for officers and bylaw votes. After consultation with the parliamentarians, Ms. Artt indicated that would be the process and those action would be moved to the Monday afternoon plenary to enable preparation of the ballots.

15-GS-13 VOTED: Ms. Artt indicated a motion was needed to suspend Rule 21 of the Standing Rules with regard to electronic voting. It was moved, seconded and adopted.

6. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Ms. Artt stated that Committees are allocated approximately fifteen minutes in which to report to the General Synod. She reminded the Delegates of the microphone layout and function.

Ms. Artt thanked the Committee Process Team, Mr. Roy Mosley (NCNC), Mr. Dennis Frische-Mouri (IK), Ms. Susan Townsley (CONN), and team leader Mr. David Anderson (PNW). She then asked the Committee Chairs to stand and be recognized and thanked all of them for their hard work and diligence.

7. RESOLUTION ON FULL COMMUNION RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST AND UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA

Ms. Artt invited Mr. Wilson to the podium to present the Resolution on Full Communion with the United Church of Canada. Mr. Wilson deferred to Ms. Thompson, UCC Ecumenical Officer, to speak to the resolution.

Discussion:

Mr. David Greenhaw (President Eden Seminary) spoke in favor. Mr. Mike Denton, Conference Minister (PNW) spoke in favor. Ms. Bernice Powell Jackson (FLA) spoke in favor. Mr. David Beebe (MOMS) spoke in favor.

Question from the floor: Ms. Brenda James (SOC) How would this resolution be staffed and how would it impact the budget?

Answer: Ms. Thompson indicated that at the present time there would be no staff sharing and it, therefore, would not affect the budget.

15-GS-14 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the resolution on Full Communion Relationship Between the United Church of Christ and the United Church of Canada.

RESOLUTION ON FULL COMMUNION RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST AND UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA

WHEREAS, the gospel of Jesus Christ unites Christ's followers in a single community of faith and compels us to make our unity visible so "that the world may believe..." John 17:21, cf. Eph. 4:4-6, 1 Cor. 12:12-26);

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ (USA) and the United Church of Canada entered into formal ecumenical partnership in 2013, with action of the Twenty-ninth General Synod of the United Church of Christ and action by the General Council of the United Church of Canada, with the commitment to continued ecumenical engagement and interaction to promote common witness;

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ and the United Church of Canada have common ecumenical partners, vision of the Church, and commitment to social justice, the inclusion of all persons, and to a diverse theological expression;

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ and the United Church of Canada in our local churches, Conferences, and in national and international settings are witnessing significant signs of the movement of the Holy Spirit toward unity; WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ and the United Church of Canada entered into a year of common discernment to seek God's will and direction for ways to live as the one body of Christ;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ, meeting in Cleveland, Ohio (26-30 June 2015) and the 42nd General Council of the United Church of Canada meeting in Corner Brook, Newfoundland (8-15 August 2015) make the following mutual declarations:

The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ acknowledges and celebrates before God that the United Church of Canada is an authentic, faithful part of the one, universal body of Christ.

The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ declares and celebrates that a relationship of full communion now exists between the United Church of Canada and the United Church of Christ (USA), by which we mean that both churches will pursue with intention ways of expressing the unity of the Church. This includes mutual commitment to recognizing ordained ministers of each partner church are truly ministers of word and sacrament, and ways of manifesting the common mission of witness and service.

The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ (USA) commits itself to work, with God's help and together with its partner churches, to effect greater unity in the whole church of Jesus Christ.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ (USA) encourages study of biblical, theological, and practical implications of full communion with the United Church of Canada and authorizes the General Minister and President to work collaboratively with the General Secretary of the United Church of Canada to appoint members of a United Church Partnership Committee to give guidance to this process.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a United Church Partnership Committee be established to give leadership to living into the possibilities of this full communion relationship through shared mission and ministry.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod receive the final report of the joint full communion working group, including the possibilities presented for common life and witness together.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the full communion partnership between the United Church of Canada and the United Church of Christ commence with the signing of the common agreement by the two Heads of Communion at a joint service of celebration that will include opportunities for local congregations and conferences across the two churches to celebrate in meaningful ways.

FUNDING

Funding for the implementation of the resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected ministries and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

8. COMMEMORATING 100 YEARS SINCE THE ARMENIAN GENOCIDE

Ms. Artt called on Ms. Bonds, Vice Chair of the Business Committee, to present the resolution. Following her presentation Ms. Bonds moved that the Thirtieth General Synod approve the resolution. She called on Mr. Moos, Executive Minister of Wider Church Ministries, to speak to the resolution.

Discussion: Ron Patterson (Business Committee) spoke in favor of the resolution.

15-GS-15 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopted the resolution Commemorating 100 Years Since the Armenian Genocide.

RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING 100 YEARS SINCE THE ARMENIAN GENOCIDE

WHEREAS, 2015 marks the 100th anniversary of the Armenian Genocide in Anatolia (modern-day Turkey) in the Ottoman Empire, during which 1.5 million Armenians were killed and more than 1 million displaced between 1915 and 1923;

WHEREAS, surviving Armenians and their descendants who are still impacted by memory and consequences of the events, and many others, continue to seek recognition of the Genocide by Turkey, the US, and other governments of the world as a form of affirmation, of acknowledgement of truth, and of historical justice, asserting that time alone is not a remedy;

WHEREAS, missionaries of our church witnessed, documented, and advocated for an end to the massacres with local and international officials, and the United Church of Christ continues to maintain close relationships with Armenians ecumenically and globally, most particularly with the Union of Armenian Evangelical Churches in the Near East and the Armenian Missionary Association of America—relationships that have had mutual impact among Armenians and among members of our church;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ marks the occasion of the centennial commemoration of the Armenian Genocide with lament for the lives that were lost, and for the lack of recognition by governments of the world, most notably Turkey and the US, of the historical event of the Genocide;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ gives thanks for the faithful witness and presence of the Armenian Christian community, and offers prayers for its continued strength particularly as it is affected by the ongoing crisis in Syria, where many Genocide survivors resettled; FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ reiterates its abhorrence when peoples and communities are made victims of violence, particularly when based on race, ethnicity, creed, or any other aspect of identity. Taken to the ultimate manifestation, such victimization constitutes genocide, a crime that should be prevented, halted, recognized, and acknowledged, in order to protect the communities, and offer recognition of the injustice it represents.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

9. RESOLUTION URGING SOCIALLY RESPONSIBLE INVESTMENT PRACTICES

Ms. Artt called on Ms. Crystal McCormick (IA), chair of the committee, to present the resolution. Ms. McCormick moved that the Thirtieth General Synod approve the resolution as amended. Thereafter, Ms. McCormick also spoke to the resolution on behalf of the committee.

Discussion:

Mr. Michael Downs (Chief Executive Office of the Pension Board) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Ms. Sheldon Culver (IS), Member of the Pension Board of the United Church of Christ spoke in favor of the resolution.

Mr. Patrick Cage (MASS) brought an amendment to the floor, seconded by Mr. Mark Pullman (MASS).

Amendment: Replace "shareholder advocacy" with "socially responsible investing practices" in paragraph identified as lines 1130-1139.

10. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. Chris Davis (Coalition for LGBT Concerns) Reminder to not assume gender identity when calling on individuals at the microphones.

Mr. Don Hart (UCF) spoke in favor of the amendment.

Mr. Graylan Hagler (MRSEJ) Asked for clarification and then spoke against the amendment.

Ms. Dawn Garrett Larson (NH) spoke in favor of the amendment.

(Name not provided) spoke against the amendment.

Mr. Tim White (MASS) spoke in favor of the amendment.

15-GS-16 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to pass the amendment and it is included in the resolution.

Discussion continued on original resolution:

Mr. Jim Antal (MASS) spoke in favor of the resolution and commended the committee on its inclusion of socially responsible divestment practices.

Mr. Hart (UCF) spoke in favor of the resolution, and also called on all members, churches and bodies of the United Church of Christ to marry our money to our faith.

Mr. Jacob Gardner (CONN) proposed a second amendment which was seconded.

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod, affirming its covenantal relationships among the various ministries and settings of the United Church of Christ, requests future General Synods develop a procedure to allow for collaboration and communication between authors of resolutions concerning socially responsible investment practices and appropriate implementing bodies prior to being considered by those individuals or settings of the Church that will approve the resolution for submission to the General Synod for consideration."

Mr. Jim Clausing (OHIO) spoke in favor of the second amendment.

Ms. Diane Dulin (CCP) asked to see the second amendment on the screen.

Ms. Brenda Brown (RM) spoke against the second amendment.

Mr. Jacob Gardner (CONN) spoke in favor of the second amendment and provided further explanation.

Ms. Diane Dulin (CCP) spoke against the second amendment.

Ms. Christine Wilke (WIS) spoke in favor of the second amendment.

Mr. Charles Baack (HI) spoke against the second amendment.

15-GS-17 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod defeated the second amendment.

15-GS-18 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the resolution urging socially responsible investment practices as amended.

RESOLUTION URGING SOCIALLY RESPONSIBLE INVESTMENT PRACTICES

WHEREAS, the historic social justice witness of the United Church of Christ (UCC) has manifested itself in multiple strategies for social, political and environmental change inspired by the biblical writings, the prophets, the teachings and life of Jesus, the historic cloud of witnesses to the Christian faith, and the leaders and the witness of transformational movements for peace, justice and equality for all, and in the light of God's unbounded love for all creation;

WHEREAS, we who are blessed with financial assets — from those with modest incomes to those entrusted with substantial wealth — bear a God-given responsibility to use our economic power to further the realm of God: From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded. (Luke 12:48, NRSV); and

WHEREAS, the economic power derived from the ownership of financial instruments presents a unique opportunity to speak truth to power and advance the cause of justice for the earth and the women, men and children of every nation; and

WHEREAS, the principles of socially responsible investing — using the power of ownership to improve environmental, social, and governance (ESG) behaviors — align with the mission of members and ministries across the United Church of Christ; and

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ's Council on Financial Investments (1969) recognized that in order to invest in a manner that lives out our faith in the marketplace, "All Instrumentalities and Conferences should actively seek involvement consistent with General Synod policies to achieve socially beneficial change in corporate practice through their ownership" of financial instruments; and

WHEREAS, widespread acceptance of the benefits of socially responsible investing have led to a growing amount (currently over 12%) of the investable assets in the United States being intentionally invested in a way that is socially responsible; and

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ is recognized as a founding member of the Interfaith Center on Corporate Responsibility (ICCR), a vanguard organization dedicated to engaging the assets of faith-based and values-driven investors in calls for corporate change; and

WHEREAS, the witness of the United Church of Christ through ICCR continues through the work of current members The Pension Boards–United Church of Christ, Inc. (PBUCC), an Affiliated Ministry of the United Church of Christ, and United Church Funds (UCF), an Associated Ministry of the United Church of Christ, both of which have practiced the principles of socially responsible investing for more than 40 years on behalf of plans and assets of the UCC, respectively; and

WHEREAS, socially responsible investing includes many practices and actions taken at many levels, including but not limited to —

- proactive investment in socially beneficial endeavors, behaviors and opportunities
- dialogues with corporate leadership in pursuit of ESG changes
- shareholder resolutions that call for better practices and more complete disclosures
- exclusionary screens which seek to limit or avoid investment in certain industries for moral or performance bases
- divestment as a last resort, when other means of engagement and witness have failed over time to achieve the desired goal(s); and

WHEREAS, shareholder advocacy, alongside other strategies of economic leverage for social justice witness, is important because of its direct engagement of publicly traded corporations with the witness of the church and the particular call to justice that the prophetic voice may bring to other shareholders, boards of directors and managers of companies in ways that cannot be duplicated by other forms of social justice action by the church; and

WHEREAS, socially responsible investors use internationally accepted guidelines and norms to determine the environmental, social and governance impacts of corporations and invested assets and do not rely on anecdotal evidence; and

WHEREAS, UCF and PBUCC seek to invest in ways that are consistent with the resolutions of General Synod and the witness of the United Church of Christ while maintaining the fiduciary controls appropriate for the particular kind of assets entrusted to each organization; and

WHEREAS, UCC polity permits and encourages different ministries of the UCC to advocate and be a witness in ways that are unique to each ministry; and

WHEREAS, socially responsible investing — alongside personal and corporate activism, intentional purchasing decisions, legislative improvements, raising awareness, and prayer; all established parts of the United Church of Christ's witness of faith — demonstrates the commitment of individuals, churches, ministries and institutions to the work of justice to which all believers are called.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ calls upon all Members, Local Churches, Associations, Conferences, Agencies, and Associated, Affiliated and Covenanted Ministries to examine and adopt socially responsible investing practices appropriate to their individual assets, retirement accounts, and endowments, as guided by the Holy Spirit's call for justice; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod urges all settings and ministries of the United Church of Christ to implement investment and financial policies and practices that promote socially responsible investment, guidelines and commitments, and to continue socially responsible investment for social justice witness on issues that the UCC has made known in past pronouncements and resolutions of General Synod in ways that are appropriate to each one; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ calls for a range of Socially Responsible investing practices and actions taken at many levels, including but not limited to —

- proactive investment in socially beneficial endeavors, behaviors and opportunities
- dialogues with corporate leadership in pursuit of environmental, social, and governance (ESG) changes
- shareholder resolutions that call for better practices and more complete disclosures
- exclusionary screens which seek to limit or avoid investment in certain industries for moral or performance based divestment when deemed appropriate; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod acknowledges, recognizes, respects and affirms that each setting and ministry of the church has unique and appropriate ways of responding to the call to implement strategies of socially responsible investing within each setting's particular charter, purpose, restrictions, and resources; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod recommends to all settings and ministries of the United Church of Christ the partnership inherent in the ministries of United Church Funds and the Pension Boards of the United Church of Christ, which offer socially responsible investing vehicles; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to bring to life God's vision for the world, a choice to invest in a socially responsible manner should not stand alone, but should be complemented by those other acts of witness that speak truth to power, using the ways and means available to each individual or organization to demand justice by sharing efforts, policies, results, and experiences of social justice witness through socially responsible investing and through regular reporting and presentations at future General Synods as an important overall witness of the UCC to advocate for justice, peace, human rights, and the environmental well-being of the planet.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Collegium of Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

11. CELEBRATION OF THE MINISTRY OF LINDA JARAMILLO

Ms. Artt called on Mr. Wilson for a special presentation.

Mr. Wilson asked the General Synod to pause to honor one of our national officers who will be ending her ministry with us to embark on a well-deserved retirement. Ms. Linda Jaramillo, Executive Minister for Justice and Witness Ministries, will step down in September from the position she has held since 2005.

As the first Latina to serve as an Officer of the United Church of Christ, Ms. Jaramillo has been a steadfast and tireless advocate for justice, peace, and the rights of all people everywhere. She is a former president and vice-president of the Council for Hispanic Ministries, co-convener of the Council of Racial and Ethnic Ministries, and a UCC delegate to the World Council of Churches Assembly in Zimbabwe. She is a former Assistant Moderator of the General Synod, the Twenty-third in Kansas City. Her contributions as an Executive Minister will be missed.

A video in honor of Ms. Jaramillo was shown, followed by a standing ovation of the General Synod body and a word of thanks and gratitude from Ms. Jaramillo.

13. RESOLUTION TO CHANGE THE RACIALLY DEMEANING NAME, MASCOT, AND IMAGERY OF THE WASHINGTON NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE TEAM

Ms. Artt invited Ms. Andrea Davis (SW), committee chair, to present the resolution. Ms. Davis moved that the Thirtieth General Synod approved the resolution as amended by the committee. Thereafter, Ms. Davis also spoke to the resolution on behalf of the committee.

Discussion:

Mr. John Deckenback (CAC) spoke in favor of the resolution, asking the body to say no to racially demeaning names in mascots and imagery.

Mr. Lloyd Schneider (NCNC) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Ms. Emily Heath (NH) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Mr. John Palowski (IS) spoke against the resolution, saying the resolution doesn't go far enough.

Mr. Bradley Thomas (CAC) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Ms. Marjorie Deaner (PW) spoke against the resolution.

Brave Flying Woman (SD) gave a passionate and emotional plea to vote in favor of the resolution.

15-GS-19 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the Resolution to Change the Racially Demeaning Name, Mascot, and Imagery of the Washington National Football League Team.

RESOLUTION TO CHANGE THE RACIALLY DEMEANING NAME, MASCOT, AND IMAGERY OF THE WASHINGTON NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE TEAM

WHEREAS, all human beings are created in the image of God (Genesis 1: 27);

WHEREAS, Jesus calls us to love one another as he has loved us (John 15: 12-17);

WHEREAS, Paul admonishes us to work for peace and mutual up building (Romans 14: 18-19);

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ is committed to the elimination of all forms of discrimination;

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ adopted at General Synod 18 (1991) a resolution condemning negative stereotyping of Native Americans;

WHEREAS, the use of racist imagery is an affront to basic human rights, undermines basic human dignity, and has a negative impact upon self-image, self-awareness, and self-esteem;

WHEREAS, the use of racist language and stereotypes continues to exploit and degrade Native American culture;

WHEREAS, the abuse of Native American symbols, such as the headdress and sacred pipe, for entertainment and profit is insensitive, insulting, and an affront to Native American spirituality and is, therefore, unacceptable;

WHEREAS, not only many professional, semi-professional, amateur, collegiate, and high and grade school sports teams throughout the United States but also (and particularly egregiously) the highly visible professional football team located in our nation's capital still employs racially derogatory and demeaning symbols, mascots, and names;

WHEREAS, the Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines "redskin" as a "usually offensive" term to describe American Indians and this term, when used in reference to Native American cultures and people, has a history of use as a pejorative and insulting name ;

WHEREAS, the term "redskins" would not properly be used by a person when addressing a Native American and should not be used to market a professional sports team;

WHEREAS, the use of the term "Redskins" for the team mascot and nickname of the Washington National Football League team is offensive and hurtful to many Native Americans and causes direct harmful effects to the public health and wellbeing of the Native American population ; and

WHEREAS, every major Native American organization, along with hundreds of clergy, churches, civil rights organizations, media outlets, sports writers and journalists, authors and elected officials (including the President of the United States), has voiced support for changing the team name;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ calls upon the National Football League's Washington franchise to change its team name and to refrain from the use of any images, mascots, or behaviors that are or could be properly deemed harmful or demeaning to Native American cultures or peoples;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ will communicate in writing this resolution to the owner of the Washington National Football League team, Daniel Snyder, and to the NFL Commissioner, Roger Goodell, and to the NFL Players Association, DeMaurice Smith, Executive Director;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ will communicate this resolution to the various conferences, affiliated and associated ministries, and instrumentalities of the United Church of Christ, and will proclaim it to the wider public through social and other media;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ urges individual churches and members of the United Church of Christ to communicate their concerns regarding this matter to both the Washington National Football League team and the National Football League by writing to:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ urges individual churches and members of the United Church of Christ to join a boycott of games played by the Washington National Football League team and not wear, display, or purchase any items with the Washington National Football League team logo until the name changes;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ supports the Oneida Indian Nation's "Change the Mascot" campaign and will contact its staff to determine the best means of support and solidarity; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ calls upon other sports teams to eradicate the use of names, images, mascots, and behaviors that are or could be properly deemed harmful or demeaning to Native American cultures or people.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

14. PRUDENTIAL RESOLUTION OF THE JUST PEACE MOVEMENT

Ms. Artt called on Ms. Sheila Guiluamme, Mr. Mike Neuroth and Ms. Susan Thistlethwaite to offer a reflection and video on the Just Peace movement.

Ms. Artt called on Ms. Bonds to introduce the resolution which is coming directly to plenary with a recommendation that it be adopted. Ms. Bonds moved the adoption of the Resolution marking the Thirtieth Anniversary of Recommitting Ourselves to a Just Peace Church.

Discussion:

Mr. Paul Chip Jahn (IK) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Mr. Jim Antal (MASS) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Ms. Yvonne Delk (SOC) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Mr. David Greenhaw (Eden Seminary) spoke in favor of the resolution.

15-GS-20 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod votes to adopt the resolution marking the Thirtieth Anniversary of the Just Peace Pronouncement by recommitting ourselves to be a Just Peace Church.

RESOLUTION MARKING THE THIRTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE JUST PEACE PRONOUNCEMENT BY RECOMMITTING OURSELVES TO BE A JUST PEACE CHURCH

WHEREAS, scripture calls us to seek God's shalom and participate in the reconciling mission of Jesus, the Prince of Peace.

WHEREAS, at its Fifteenth General Synod in Ames, Iowa the General Synod adopted the pronouncement "Affirming the United Church of Christ as a Just Peace Church," and called on its local churches, conferences and national bodies to "organize their common life so as to make a difference in the achieving of a Just Peace and the ending of the institution of war."

WHEREAS, in the thirty years since the adoption of the Just Peace pronouncement, we have seen protracted violent conflicts, intractable systemic injustices, and crippling cultural prejudices resolved using just peacemaking practices.

WHEREAS, in the thirty years since the adoption of the Just Peace pronouncement, many United Church of Christ Conferences, Seminaries, Institutions, and congregations have declared themselves Just Peace communities and have adopted policies and strategies to live out this call.

WHEREAS, in the year 2001, the United Church of Christ along with other global faith communities affirmed and participated actively in the World Council of Churches "Decade to Overcome Violence: Churches Seeking Reconciliation and Peace" program, and joined with other communions in marking the end of the decade in 2011 at the International Ecumenical Peace Convocation in Kingston, Jamaica.

WHEREAS, the World Council of Churches commended for study and action an "Ecumenical Call to Just Peace," and re-affirmed at its General Assembly in Busan in 2013 a "Statement on the Way of Just Peace," highlighting a growing ecumenical consensus toward Just Peacemaking, calling on member churches to join an "Ecumenical Pilgrimage of Justice and Peace," by seeking peace in four distinct contexts:

For Just Peace in the Community- so that all may live free from fear, For Just Peace with the Earth- so that life is sustained, For Just Peace in the Marketplace- so that all may live in dignity, For Just Peace among the Nations- so that human lives are protected

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod mark the 30th Anniversary of the Just Peace Pronouncement by reinvigorating the Just Peace movement in the United Church of Christ and beyond. In common cause with all who seek peace with justice, a renewed Just Peace movement will most surely include ecumenical relations with Christian Churches throughout the world, interfaith partnerships in the United States and beyond, and strong new alliances wherever they may be made.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that each congregation of the United Church of Christ be invited to become a Just Peace congregation, if they have not already done so.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod invites a litany of covenant making to be celebrated throughout the church and spread liberally across the minutes, publications and communication media of the United Church of Christ. Let this litany give God Praise for the first thirty years of witness in the United Church of Christ as a Just Peace church and covenant all who pray it into a common bond of love and service.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod invites congregations of the United Church of Christ to mark the Sunday preceding September 21 (which the United Nation recognizes as the "International Day of Prayer" for Peace as Just Peace Sunday.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod invites all settings of the church who have committed themselves to Just Peace to create local, regional, and national partnerships and networks with the encouragement and support of the Covenanted Ministries of the United Church of Christ; to raise awareness of conflictual justice issues, share concerns, stories, and experience of Just Peace practices at work, and build constituencies around Just Peacemaking.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

15. DEVELOPING WELCOMING, INCLUSIVE, SUPPORTIVE AND ENGAGED CONGREGATIONS FOR MENTAL HEALTH

Ms. Artt called on Ms. Lessie Williams (CPC) chair of the committee to introduce the resolution and the amendments made by the committee. Ms. Williams moved the adoption of the resolution by the Thirtieth General Synod.

She then called on Mr. Alan Johnson (RM) who spoke in support of the resolution.

Discussion:

Ms. Linda Bigler – Disabilities Ministries (CPC) spoke in favor of the resolution. Mr. Paul Clay (CA NV, S) spoke in favor of the resolution and urged the body to learn how to be a welcoming and inclusive congregation. Mr. Mark Stewart (MNWC) spoke in favor of the resolution

Mr. Mark Stewart (MNWC) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Mr. Kevin Pettit (RM) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Mr. Samuel Conde (FLA) and Mr. Chris Davis moved to make a motional to amend the resolution, adding the following to the final Be It Resolved:

Proposed Amendment:

"BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod encourages advocacy by all settings of the Church for broader and more just access to quality mental health services including private and public insurance coverage. This advocacy includes services for all persons with mental illness who are falling through the fraying safety net, especially persons in jails/prisons, persons who are homeless, persons of color, persons across all spectrums of sexuality and transgender and gender non-conforming who are experiencing mental illness."

Discussion:

Ms. Manda Adams (NY) spoke in favor of the amendment.

Ms. Artt called the order of the day and indicated that the discussion would be picked up during the fifth plenary.

16. REPORT ON THE COMMISSION OF THE FUTURE OF GENERAL SYNOD

Ms. Artt called upon Mr. Black to bring a report to this General Synod outlining its work to date and bringing forth any recommendations it might have.

Mr. Black said that it seems likely that the general body wants to continue every two years. General Synod is very expensive, but it brings us together and it renews us.

Finance options to consider:

- Some cost savings in making it shorter.
- Some cost savings in establishing a semi-permanent two in Cleveland and then another in another part of the country.
- Alter composition of synod. We open synod to every church. Every church could send one delegate and their pastor at their own expense. That would pay for synod.
- Other considering making every synod a committee of discernment.
- Other considering making it less business oriented with more prayer and Bible Study.
- Other considering making it more affordable to youth, families and students.

Mr. Black indicated that the commission will work with the incoming President in the future.

Over the next year they will be asking conferences to consider what they have heard and then will bring the necessary changes to the next Synod in Baltimore. It is imperative that we face these issues, we must find the means of financially supporting General Synod in a responsible way in the future.

17. THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION

Ms. Artt called on Mr. Matthew Laney, Senior Minister of Asylum Hill Congregational Church in Hartford, Connecticut, to offer a theological reflection on our time together this morning.

Mr. Laney brought a message about making choices – making the best choices. Doing the life giving thing for all people. The life of what the UCC is about.

Ms. Kelli Parrish-Lucas (UCC Disabilities Ministries) Proposed the following: "Line 1093 – move on line 1087 – Read as follows: This advocacy includes services for all persons with mental illness who are falling through the fraying safety net, especially persons in jail/prisons, and persons who are homeless, as well as persons of color, persons of all sexual orientation, and/or persons of all gender identities who experience mental health issues."

Seconded by: Chris Davies (Coalition for LGBT Concerns)

Ms. Thea Racelis (Business Committee) spoke in favor of the new amendment.

- Mr. Steven Moore (IK) spoke against the amendment since the committee agreed that it would not include a laundry list of people who are impacted by the issues.
- Ms. Danielle Rochford (UCC Disabilities Ministries) spoke in favor of the amendment.

Ms. Brittany LaFleur (CONN) spoke against the amendment.

Ms. Linda Bigler (Business Committee) Spoke in support of amendment

Mr. Samuel Conde (FLA) Spoke in support of amendment

Mr. Paul Clay (CA NV, S) called the question.

15-GS-21 VOTED The Thirtieth General Synod votes to close debate on the amendment.

15-GS 22 VOTED The Thirtieth General Synod votes to defeat the amendment to the resolution.

Discussion on original resolution:

Mr. Eric Kendall (KO) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Mr. Ian Winham (CONN) moved the following amendment which was seconded.

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod encourages congregations to work to eradicate stigma around mental illnesses/brain disorders and advocate for better mental health services for those who are falling through the fraying safety net." Remove any reference to specific persons.

Mr. Lloyd Schneider (CA NV, N) spoke in favor of the amendment.

Ms. Mary Alice Suitors (IL) spoke against the amendment.

Mr. Steven Moore (IK) spoke in favor of the amendment.

Mr. Patrick Cage (MASS) spoke against the amendment.

15-GS-23 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod defeated the amendment.

15 GS-24 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the resolution on developing welcoming, inclusive, supportive and engaged congregations for Mental Health.

DEVELOPING WELCOMING, INCLUSIVE, SUPPORTIVE AND ENGAGED CONGREGATIONS FOR MENTAL HEALTH

WHEREAS, most people believe that mental illnesses are rare and "happen to someone else," when in fact, mental illnesses are common and widespread with an estimated 61.5 million Americans (1 in 4) experiencing some form of mental illness in a given year;

WHEREAS, there continues to be strong stigma and discrimination in society against people with these brain disorders in housing, employment, social relationships, (including how they are treated in our churches);

WHEREAS, many uninformed people believe people with mental illnesses are likely to be violent, while in reality, people with mental illnesses are more likely to be victims of violence than perpetrators;

WHEREAS, the public mental health system, which previously served as a safety net for people with the most severe mental illnesses, has suffered from dramatic funding cuts in the last decade, and our prisons and county jails now house more people with mental illnesses than psychiatric hospitals do;

WHEREAS, faith and spirituality can be an important component of recovery from mental illnesses and addictions;

WHEREAS, a mental illness or brain disorder in the family affects not only the ill family member, it profoundly affects other family members and loved ones and the entire family structure;

WHEREAS, people having a diagnosable brain disorder and/or substance abuse disorder are potentially at a higher risk for suicide;

WHEREAS, the church is called to be a community that breaks through fear and isolation to offer love, hope, care and healing;

WHEREAS, Jesus showed us the way to reach out to those who are ill or marginalized to offer companionship, compassion and support;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod encourages United Church of Christ congregations to adopt covenants to be WISE (Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, Engaged) Congregations for Mental Health.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod encourages congregations to work to eradicate stigma around mental illnesses/brain disorders, and to offer support to persons with and those impacted by mental health challenges, including their family members, loved ones and others concerned.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod encourages advocacy by all settings of the church for broader and more just access to quality mental health services including private and public insurance coverage. This advocacy includes services for all persons with mental illness who are falling through the fraying safety net, especially persons in jails/prisons, and persons who are homeless.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries and other entities of the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

5. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE.

Ms. Jaramillo asked to lift up Ms. Loey Powell whose mother passed away a few moments ago. Ms. Jaramillo offered a prayer on behalf of Ms. Powell and her family.

6. ELECTION OF JAMES MOOS

Ms. Artt recapped that on Friday General Synod received the re-nomination of Mr. Moos as Executive Minister of Wider Church Ministries and the nomination of Mr. Dorhauer as General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ.

The motion is as follows:

On October 17, 2014 the United Church of Christ Board of Directors, sitting as the Wider Church Ministries Board of Directors, re-nominated for election by the Thirtieth General Synod the selection of its Re-nomination Committee, Mr. Moos of the Northern Plains Conference for a second four-year term as Executive Minister of Wider Church Ministries of the United Church of Christ and submits its re-nomination for consideration by delegates to the Thirtieth General Synod, meeting June 26-30, 2015 in Cleveland, Ohio.

Ballots were then distributed in accordance with the instructions previously announced.

15-GS-25 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod calls Mr. Moos for a second four-year term as Executive Minister of Wider Church Ministries of the United Church of Christ.

7. ELECTION OF THE NEXT GENERAL MINISTER AND PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST

Ms. Artt moved on to the election of Mr. Dorhauer.

On March 19, 2015 the United Church of Christ Board of Directors nominated for call by election by the Thirtieth General Synod the selection of its Search Committee, Mr. Dorhauer of the Southwest Conference as the next General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ and submits its nomination for consideration by delegates to the Thirtieth General Synod meeting June 26-30, 2015 in Cleveland. The Motion comes from the Board and does not need a second.

Discussion:

- Mr. Graylan Hagler (MRSEJ) spoke against the nomination and also objected to the presentation and raised the questions of Mr. Dorhauer's insensitivity, and asked for an apology by Mr. Dorhauer.
- Mr. Emmery Groomes (SW) spoke in favor of Mr. Dorhauer's nomination and spoke of Mr. Dorhauer's competency and his achievements.
- Mr. Doug Clark (CONN) stated that he was disappointed in the process and the choice that led to the election.
- Mr. Jacob Gardner (CONN) spoke in favor of Mr. Dorhauer, as a part of the Search Committee and as a youth, saying it was about who the Spirit was calling to lead the Church.
- Ms. Anna Hubleton (SC) spoke against the nomination because it's time to call a woman.
- Mr. Felix Villenaver (CA NV, S) spoke in favor of the nomination, believing that Mr. Dorhauer is The right person.
- Ms. Alice Hunt (CTS) spoke in favor of the nomination based on a review of all of the applications received.
- Ms. Heather Archovich (MOM) spoke in favor of the nomination.
- Mr. Roberto Ochoa (CHM) spoke in favor of the nomination.
- Ms. Katelyn Lenley (KO) spoke in favor of the nomination. Why are we still debating on looks and not going off of qualifications alone?
- Mr. Daniel Kirk (OHIO) spoke in favor of the nomination.
- Ms. Cassandra Granados (NY) spoke against the nomination because she thinks it is time for a woman.

Ms. Mary Jane Huber (WIS) called the question, and it was seconded.

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. Graylan Hagler (MRSEJ) stated that there needed to be a vote on calling the question.

15-GS-26 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to close debate on election of Mr. Dorhauer.

15-GS-27 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod calls the Rev. John C. Dorhauer as the next General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ.

8. ELECTIONS OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST BOARD, THE MODERATOR AND ASSISTANT MODERATOR, AND THE GENERAL SYNOD NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Mr. Holeman indicated that the next order of business was the elections for various offices of the Church.

First, the election of members to the United Church of Christ Board of Directors, electing 13 members, 12 to full terms, one to fill a vacancy. The names of the nominees, selected by the General Synod Nominating Committee, have been posted for delegate review since January. The motion to elect these individuals comes from a Committee of the General Synod and requires no second.

15 GS-28 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to elect the 13 members of the Board of Directors as posted for delegate review.

Mr. Holeman next moved to the election of the Moderator, of the Thirty-First General Synod. It was the stated intent of the authors of the new governance structure that there would be a graduation of leadership in this position, that the Assistant Moderator from one biennium would move up, be elected, as Moderator for the next biennium. Accordingly, the General Synod Nominating Committee has selected Ms. Artt for election as Moderator of the Thirty-First General Synod.

15 GS-29 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to elect Ms. Sue Artt as the Moderator of the Thirty-first General Synod.

Mr. Holeman then moved the election of Mr. Norman Williams as the Assistant Moderator of the Thirty-first General Synod.

15 GS-30 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to elect Mr. Norman Williams as the Assistant Moderator of the Thirty-first General Synod.

(Unknown name and conference) objected to the election without discussion.Mr. Holeman ruled objection out of order.Mr. Graylan Hager (MRSEJ) appealed the ruling of the Moderator.Mr. Holeman acknowledged the right to appeal.

9. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. Jacob Gardner (CT) asked to be led in prayer and guidance.

Mr. Black prayed for grounding and for the reminder that our work is about Christ's ministry of love and compassion.

Mr. Holeman ruled to reopen the election of Ms. Artt as Moderator and Mr. Williams as Assistant Moderator and allow for discussion.

Mr. Ian Holland (MASS) asked about closing debate and moving onto a whole new subject. He wanted to know if that was in accordance with Parliamentary Procedure. Parliamentarians ruled that it was appropriate.

Mr. Holeman asked if there was any discussion on the election of Ms. Artt, and there was no discussion.

15 GS-31 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to elect Ms. Artt as the Moderator of the Thirty-first General Synod.

Mr. Holeman asked if there was any discussion on the election of Norman Williams as the Assistant Moderator of the Thirty-first General Synod, and there was no discussion

15 GS-32 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted (again) to elect Mr. Williams as the Assistant Moderator of the Thirty-first General Synod.

Mr. Holeman indicated that the next, and final election, is to the General Synod Nominating Committee, Class of 2021. The Board of Directors selects the nominees for this position. There are four nominees this time. They are Ms. PamelaJune Anderson, Ms. Jean Avison, Mr. Christopher Rankin and Mr. Joseph Sejneha. Nominations from the floor are not allowed for these positions.

Mr. Holeman asked for discussion, and there was no discussion.

15 GS-33 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to elect Ms. Anderson, Ms. Avison, Mr. Rankin and Mr. Sejneha to the General Synod Nominating Committee, Class of 2021.

Mr. Holeman congratulated the nominees and asked them to stand and be recognized. There was applause.

<u>10. RECOGNITION OF NEW AND RETIRING CONFERENCE</u> <u>**MINISTERS**</u>

Mr. Holeman called upon Mr. Kent Siladi, Chair of the Cabinet of the Counsel of Conference Ministers and Conference Minister of the Connecticut Conference, to recognize the new and retiring Conference Ministers.

Mr. Siladi recognized that all are called to ministry of one form or another. In the United Church of Christ there are some who are called into ministry and leadership in the Conference setting. The 38 Conferences across the United Church of Christ call persons to serve as their Conference Minister. Each Conference Minister serves uniquely in their particular Conference where they are invited to help shape the vision, mission and ministry of their setting. Each Conference Minister provides leadership beyond the Conference they serve through the Council of Conference Ministers and by providing leadership to other Boards and ministries of the National setting.

<u>11. PRESENTATION OF RESOLUTION ENTITLED A JUST AND COMPASSIONATE</u> <u>RESPONSE IN THE WAKE OF THE SHOOTINGS AT EMMANUEL AME CHURCH IN</u> <u>CHARLESTON, SOUTH CAROLINA.</u>

Mr. Holeman introduced the resolution coming directly to the General Synod and called upon Mr. Wilson, Chair of the Business Committee to present the resolution.

Mr. Wilson asked the body to make a change in the Resolution on Line 23. The change was to change the founding date of the church from 1691 to 1681. Mr. Wilson spoke to the pain and sorrow as a result of the June 17, 2015 murder of nine people at the Emmanuel AME church and moved that the body adopt the resolution as corrected. He then called on Mr. Jeremy Ruthledge to speak to the resolution. Mr. Rutledge asked those gathered to hold in prayer the people of Charleston, South Carolina, and to pass the resolution and in doing so to honor the Charleston nine and speak out against white privilege.

15-GS-34 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to adopt the Resolution entitled A Just and Compassionate Response in the Wake of the Shootings at Emmanuel AME Church in Charleston, South Carolina.

A JUST AND COMPASSIONATE RESPONSE IN THE WAKE OF THE SHOOTINGS AT EMANUEL A.M.E. CHURCH IN CHARLESTON, SOUTH CAROLINA

WHEREAS, nine sisters and brothers in Christ were slain while in a Bible study at Emanuel A.M.E. Church in Charleston, South Carolina on June 17, 2015, and

WHEREAS, there exists a relationship in ministry among churches in Charleston, South Carolina that seeks to address issues of poverty and injustice including Circular Congregational Church and the Charleston Area Justice Ministry which engages in research, educates the public, and publically addresses the root causes of, and solutions to, poverty and injustice in their communities and seeks to transform the systems that cause suffering by holding local officials accountable for resolving these inequities and injustices, and

WHEREAS, the members of the Southeast Conference have sought to reach out to faith leaders in Charleston and South Carolina by presence in worship, standing in vigil, and offering prayers and solace to UCC members who lost family members in the shooting, and

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ has historically sought to address issues of gun violence, racism, and justice as evidenced by the resolutions "Violence in our Society and World" and "Guns and Violence" adopted by General Synod 20, "Resolution Calling on the United Church of Christ to Renew the Battle Against Racism in All of Its Guises" adopted by General Synod 24, and the pastoral letter from the Collegium in 2013 which addressed gun violence and another pastoral letter from the Collegium in 2015 on racism, "A New Awakening," and

WHEREAS, the Confederate flag has been, and continues to be a divisive and controversial symbol of violence, discrimination, oppression, hatred and racism, and that the United Church of Christ has responded to symbols of racial oppression such as the symbolic logo of the Washington football team and the symbolic caricature of the Cleveland baseball team from the stance that justice is a theological issue, not a political issue, and that symbols that are indicative of racial oppression should be resisted;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ reach out in Christian love to communicate to the members of Emanuel A.M.E Church our deep sympathy for their loss and the shattering of safe space in their house of worship and to assure other houses of faith in Charleston that we stand in witness to their faith and courage and pray as the psalmist does that "Violence shall no more be heard in your land, devastation or destruction within your borders; you shall call your walls Salvation, and your gates Praise. (Psalm 60:18)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Collegium take appropriate actions to comfort and provide support for members and pastors of the United Church of Christ who lost family on June 17, 2015.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ stands in solidarity with South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley, the more than thirty South Carolina State Legislators, the South Carolina NAACP, South Carolina Christian Action Council, and other residents of the State of South Carolina in their call to have the Confederate flag removed from the grounds of the South Carolina State House. BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ encourages pastors and congregations to renew their efforts to address issues of racism and violence in their communities and to promote fruitful relationships with other communities of faith in their cities and towns, especially through spiritual reflection in order to better understand the roots of violence and racism in our culture, consider the resources of our faith in ending such racism and violence, and taking action in our local communities and with ecumenical and interfaith partners to address the needs of the community to restore human dignity, meet the needs of healthy and wholesome life, and show the love of God to all the world.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Collegium of Officers, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

12. DISMANTLING DISCRIMINATORY SYSTEMS OF MASS INCARCERATION IN THE UNITED STATES

Mr. Holman called upon Mr. Bob Thompson (SOC) to introduce the resolution. Mr. Thompson introduced the resolution and moved that General Synod adopt the resolution as submitted with changes from the committee. Mr. Thompson also spoke to the resolution.

Discussion:

Mr. Eric Moehler (MOMS) submitted the following amendment, which was seconded:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ calls for the cessation of all lock-up quotas, specifically the 34,000 immigrant detention bed quota, and the cessation of all detention facility contracts specifying a payment based on a quaranteed minimum number of detainees."

Ms. Rebecca Glenn (SW) spoke in favor of the amendment.

(Unknown name and conference) spoke against the amendment.

- Mr. Tom Shipley (CONN) asked for clarification from the presenter of the amendment.
- Mr. Thompson (SOC) indicated that his role was not to advocate or opposed the amendment but that the amendment belongs to the floor.
- Mr. David Beebe (MOMS) spoke in favor of the amendment.
- Mr. Irvin Milton (SOC) spoke against the amendment.
- Mr. Louis Mitchell (MASS) spoke in favor of the amendment.
- Ms. Diana Modoshi (NC NV, N) spoke against the amendment.
- Mr. Eric Moeller (MOMS) spoke in favor of the amendement.
- Mr. Paul Clay (CA NV, S) called the question and it was seconded.

15-GS-35 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to close debate on the amendment.

15-GS-36 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted. Mr. Holeman declares a division in the house, and the vote is retaken with the presentation of delegate cards. The Thirtieth General Synod defeated the amendment.

15-GS-37 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adoptes the resolution on Dismantling Discrimnatory Systems of Mass Incarceration in the United States with suggested changes by Committee.

DISMANTLING DISCRIMNATORY SYSTEMS OF MASS INCARCERTAION IN THE UNITED STATES

WHEREAS, since the 1980s, non-violent drug offenses have led to substantial sentencing of people of all races; however, punishment lodged against African Americans has been extreme. For example, the rate of drug use among White and African Americans is the same, African American men comprise 66% of the people in prison for drug use.

WHEREAS, African American men are currently more likely to be controlled by the criminal justice system, prosecuted more often, sentenced for longer terms, often prohibited from voting, and disqualified from serving on a jury, all the while continuing to suffer discrimination in employment, housing, and federal assistance.

WHEREAS, Justice Commission Hearings on Mass Incarceration conducted by the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference found evidence supporting author Michelle Alexander's position that mass incarceration is the "New Jim Crow," creating a system of modern-day enslavement. According to the findings, "it is apparent that the system of mass incarceration in the U.S. is replete with human rights violations by standards of the U.S. Constitution and the United Nations International Standards of Conduct."

WHEREAS, the private prison industry aggressively solicits contracts from federal and state governments to provide facilities for prisoners, and specifically target detention of undocumented immigrants; many of which contracts require a minimum of 90% utilization of jail bed space. Texas leads the nation in the number of private prison beds, and New Mexico outsources the largest percentage of its inmate population to private corporations (43.8%) in the nation. Arizona, which now incarcerates over 13% of its prisoners in private prisons and is known as the national epicenter for incarcerating undocumented immigrants.

WHEREAS, people of color bear the brunt of our "criminal justice" system, no one is exempt from the problems of prosecutorial overreach, a poor public defender system, uneven sentencing, unreasonable parole practices, lack of funding for re-entry programs, and the use of prisons to house people for whom treatment for mental illness is not available. WHEREAS, jails and prisons hold more individuals with serious mental illness than the largest remaining state psychiatric hospital in 44 of the 50 states and the District of Columbia. In 2012, there were estimated to be 356,268 inmates with severe mental illness incarcerated, at the same time, there were approximately 35,000 patients with severe mental illness in state psychiatric hospitals proving that the number of mentally ill persons in prisons and jails was ten times the number remaining in state hospitals.

WHEREAS, the growing prison industry is producing a vast underclass of former felons. The situation regarding prisoner reentry is dire. About three-quarters of a million prisoners are being released in the community each year. They face extreme hardship in housing, employment, family reunification, health and mental health care, and general isolation and alienation. They also suffer from debt (required restitution and associated parole and probation fees, fines, and penalties, with little or no income), as well as possible voting and entitlement disenfranchisement.

WHEREAS, estimates indicate that unduplicated expenditures to maintain the prison industrial complex are \$300 billion per year. The burden of such expenditures has led to the increasing privatization of that complex, especially in rural areas with small populations, where there is a need for employment and other commerce, including suppliers of goods and services. As a business, the first priority of private companies is profit; therefore, income for private prisons depends entirely on maintaining a large and stable inmate population. But the demand for guaranteed occupancy rates runs counter to efforts toward early release, alternative sentencing, and other forms of restitution, especially in cases of non-violent crimes.

WHEREAS, private prisons are exempt from some fundamental legal reporting mechanisms, including public reporting of crimes and escapes and the Freedom of Information Act. While confirmed data is hard to find, reliable sources indicate that the largest percentage of persons incarcerated in private prisons are African American men and women.

WHEREAS, according to the U.S. Department of Justice, the link between academic failure, delinquency, violence, and crime is welded to reading. Reliable data indicates that 85% of juveniles who interface with the court system are functionally illiterate and 70% of inmates in prison cannot read above fourth grade reading level. Inmates who receive no reading help have a 70% chance of returning to prison; this risk reduces to 16% for those who receive such assistance.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ identifies mass incarceration as a critical human and civil rights issue in the U.S. because of its disparate impact on and disenfranchisement of people of color, youth, and people with limited economic resources; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ reaffirms its commitment to speak and act prophetically to disrupt and dismantle the growing prison industrial complex in the United States;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, to turn this tide of institutionalized racism and economic injustice by mass incarceration in the United States, that Justice and Witness Ministries, Conferences, and local congregations are encouraged to provide opportunities for education, mobilization, public witness, and public policy advocacy as outlined in the action plan.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries and other entities of the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

Mr. Holman announced the final count of the written ballot votes for Mr. Dorhauer. There was a standing ovation, Mr. Dorhauer and his wife appeared to express thanks, and Mr. Holman thanked and excused the tellers for their service.

13. THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION

Mr. Holeman called on Ms. Rosas to reflect on our time together. Ms. Rosas called on the body to do some stretching and reflecting on God's invitation to tend and to nurture all creation.

15-GS-38 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adoptes the resolution on Dismantling the New Jim Crow with suggested amendments from the Committee.

DISMANTLING THE NEW JIM CROW A Resolution of Witness

WHEREAS, The "New Jim Crow," the term used to describe the marginalization and resubjugation of African Americans under the guise of the so-called War on Drugs, various gettough-on-crime policies, and mass incarceration, is causing horrific pain, untold suffering, and irreparable damage to millions of African Americans;

WHEREAS, millions of African American men and women are under control of the criminal justice system, unable to vote or serve on juries but able to be discriminated against legally in employment, housing, and federal assistance;

WHEREAS, even though the rate of drug use among white and black Americans is the same, African Americans are prosecuted more often, receive harsher sentences, and serve longer terms for violations of laws prohibiting the use and distribution of drugs. Indeed, men of color comprise sixty-six percent of the people in prison for drug use (African Americans forty-two percent and Hispanics twenty-four percent);

WHEREAS, young African American men comprise fourteen percent of young men in the United States, yet comprise forty percent of young men in prison;

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court of The United States has held that such glaring statistical disparities are inadmissible as reasons for bringing actions to remedy these injustices, even in states in which ninety percent of people imprisoned for violations of drug laws are African Americans;

WHEREAS, General Synods of the United Church Of Christ have passed resolutions and pronouncement calling the church to action to help find solutions to the resurgence of racism, the seemingly endless War on Drugs, the problem of mass incarceration and the growth of the prisonindustrial complex, and the reality of racial and class bias in arrests and sentencing, as well as resolutions and pronouncements calling the church to seek justice in policing, housing, and employment for people who have served felony sentences, to address inadequate legal representation for the indigent, to provide training and rehabilitation for prison inmates, and to restore voting rights for people who have served their time;

WHEREAS, not only the War on Drugs continues unabated but also the privatization of the prison industrial complex grows unimpeded, with the result that the United States, with only five percent of the world's population, incarcerates twenty-five percent of the world's prisoners, the highest percentage of incarceration in the world;

WHEREAS, Justice Commission Hearings on Mass Incarceration conducted by the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference found evidence supporting author Michelle Alexander's position that mass incarceration is an essential aspect of the "New Jim Crow," creating a system of modern-day enslavement. (2014 Report, Bearing Witness: A Nation in Chains). Indeed, according to the findings, "it is apparent that the system of mass incarceration in the U.S. is replete with human rights violations by standards of the U.S. Constitution and the United Nations International Standards of Conduct"; WHEREAS, the growing prison industry is producing a vast underclass of former felons. Indeed, the situation regarding prisoner re-entry is dire. About three-quarters of a million prisoners are being released in the community each year. They face extreme hardship in housing, employment, family reunification, health and mental health care, and general isolation and alienation. They also suffer from debt (required restitution and associated parole and probation fees, fines, and penalties, with little or no income), as well as voting and entitlement disenfranchisement;

WHEREAS, as a result of such legally permissible disenfranchisement, more African American men were disqualified from voting in 2014 than in 1870, the year the Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution was ratified;

WHEREAS, in some of our largest cities, the high school dropout rate is over fifty percent; in public schools across America, only ten percent of eighth grade black males read at or above a proficient level; and, in our national capital, three of every four young African American males can expect to serve time in prison; and

WHEREAS, the link among academic failure, delinquency, violence, and crime is welded to reading (The U.S. Department of Justice). Indeed, reliable data indicates that 85% of juveniles who interface with the court system are functionally illiterate and 70% of inmates in prison cannot read above fourth grade reading level. Inmates who receive no reading help have a 70% chance of returning to prison, while the risk of recidivism reduces to 16% for those who receive such assistance;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ support and reaffirm prior resolutions and pronouncements calling the church to continued sacred conversations on race and to engage in prophetic speech and action directed at eliminating systemic racism in all its guises, ending the "War on Drugs," stopping mass incarceration and the growth of the prison-industrial complex, ending racial and class bias in arrests and sentencing, implementing justice in policing, housing, and employment for people who have served felony sentences, addressing inadequate legal representation for the indigent, providing training and rehabilitation for prison inmates, and restoring voting rights for people who have served their sentences;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ identify "the New Jim Crow,"" defined as the disenfranchisement, marginalization, and resubjugation of African Americans and accordingly the creation of a permanent caste of secondclass citizens, as a critical human and civil rights issue in the United States on account of its devastating political, legal, and social effects upon African Americans, other people of color, youth, and people with limited economic and other resources; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ urges Justice and Witness Ministries, Conferences, Associations, and local congregations to provide opportunities for education, including a resource with information on the biblical and theological foundations on race, mobilization, public witness, and public policy advocacy to dismantle the New Jim Crow and to turn this tide of institutionalized racism and economic injustice.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries and other entities of the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

6. A CALL FOR PEACE, JUSTICE AND REUNIFICATION IN THE KOREAN PENINSULA.

Mr. Holeman called on Ms. Denise Mason-Bullitt (PNW) to present the resolution regarding A Call for Peace, Jusice and Reunification in the Korean Peninsula. Ms. Mason-Bullitt moved that the Thirtieth General Synod adopt the resolution as amended. She then spoke to the resolution on behalf of the committee.

Discussion:

Mr. Hunjung Cho (Overseas Delegate) spoke in favor of the resolution. Ms. Kelly Parish Lucas (UCC Disabilities) spoke in favor of the resolution. Mr. William VerDuin (IS) spoke in favor of the resolution.

15-GS-39 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod adopts the resolution on a Call for Peace, Justice and Reunification in the Korean Peninsula.

A CALL FOR PEACE, JUSTICE AND REUNIFICATION IN THE KOREAN PENINSULA

WHEREAS, the Korean War ended on July 27, 1953 with the signing of an Armistice Agreement and creation of a demilitarized zone between the two Korean regimes, which was designed by the U.S. and Soviet Union in August 15, 1945 as only a temporary political arrangement, and yet after sixty years a formal peace treaty has never been reached, leaving the peninsula and its people divided by fear and hostility, and subject to recurring incidents of violence;

WHEREAS, 2015 marks the 70th anniversary of Korea's independence from Japanese occupation, enabled by the U.S. through the Taft-Katsura Agreement in 1905, yet the Korean people are still not free from the occupation of extensive militarization, and of antagonistic domestic policies and Cold War international politics, intensified in recent years as South Korea, a client of U.S. military hegemony in North East Asia, has been the apex of an aggressive U.S. policy to "pivot" or reposition arms and forces into the Pacific;

WHEREAS, for more than 60 years the U.S. has led sustained economic sanctions on North Korea, continues to wield wartime operational control of South Korea's military, and has planned to deploy the Terminal High Altitude Area Defense (THAAD) anti-ballistic missile system in the country to intercept missiles from North Korea, China and Russia, further threatening the peace and security of the Korean Peninsula and Northeast Asia;

WHEREAS, communities and families separated by the Korean War and subsequent division between the North and South desire reunion and reconciliation before generations pass without ever seeing or knowing the fate of loved ones; and separated families have rarely been able to communicate or visit across the border, but rather have been kept distant, disconnected, and often are used as leverage in political negotiations;

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ maintains a close partnership with the Presbyterian Church in the Republic of Korea, which together with the National Council of Churches in Korea, the Korean Christian Federation of North Korea, and with the World Council of Churches 10th Assembly meeting in 2013 in Busan, Korea, have called on the international community to advance a new era of commitment to work for peace and reunification in the Korean peninsula;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ, reminded that the Twenty-Fourth General Synod in 2003 resolved to advocate for "Peace and Reconciliation in the Korean Peninsula," being grieved that the Korean people remain divided and disrupted by recurring violence and hostility more than 60 years after the end of the Korean War, faithfully joins our partners the Presbyterian Church in the Republic of Korea and the National Council of Churches in Korea, as well as responds to the World Council of Churches 10th Assembly, in recommitting our communion to work for peace and justice; and committing to work for reunification in the Korean peninsula;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod, recognizing that 2015 is the 70th anniversary of the liberation of Korea from occupation at the end of the Second World War, and yet that the peninsula remains occupied by militarization and nuclear weapons, and believing that with "God all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26), advocate that the U.S. government and international community commence a new process of peace-building across the Korean peninsula, that includes a commitment by all parties to replace the Armistice Agreement of 1953 with a permanent peace treaty, finally bringing an end to the state of war; and a mutual commitment to end provocative military exercises on the peninsula, to reduce military expenditures, and to eliminate nuclear weapons on the peninsula, establishing a model for peace and demilitarization in Northeast Asia;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod, trusting that Christ "has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us" (Eph. 2:14), rededicates itself to accompany our Korean partners in their efforts, working with the governments in both North and South Korea, with the churches and Christians in both North and South Korea, and through religious, humanitarian and advocacy initiatives, to seek the reconciliation and restoration of families and communities long divided by conflict and hostility, so that social, spiritual and psychological healing can occur among the people of Korea;

FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod calls upon its members and congregations to accompany our partners in Korea by praying for peace with the peoples and churches of Korea, recognizing the Sunday before August 15, Korean Liberation Day, as the "Sunday of Prayer for the Peaceful Reunification of the Korean Peninsula"; by expressing

solidarity through relationship building trips, in partnership with Global Ministries as their ecumenical partner, to churches in North and South Korea; by supporting efforts such as the World Council of Churches' Tozanso Process and complementary initiatives to foster dialogue, reconciliation, and mutual support between the North and South; and by advocating that the U.S. Congress and Administration change U.S. foreign policy and military strategy and pursue policies of peace and reunification.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

7. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Ms. Min Heui Cheon asked for prayer in the passing of this resolution. Mr. Moos offered a prayer of thanksgiving.

8. CELEBRATION OF THE MINISTRY OF MR. GEOFFREY BLACK

Mr. Holeman introduced Mr. Wilson, Chair of the Board of Directors, to introduce a time of celebration of Mr. Black as the General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ.

An original musical piece "A Bow Tie and A Smile" written by Mr. John Dornhauer, Jr. was performed.

A video tribute to Mr. Black was shown and a standing ovation ensued.

Mr. Black gave some reflections of his ministry as General Minister and President. "We are in this thing together". He has always felt the support and loving care of the Church. We have shared much change. Thanks for the willingness for the need for change. Being General Minister and President has been a blessed challenge. He is convinced that the church universal and this country has a need for the UCC. We are all family – children of God.

9. THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION

Mr. Holeman invited Mr. Molsberry to offer a theological reflection of our time together this evening.

10. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mr. Holeman called on Mr. Foley for announcements.

Ms. Artt called the Seventh Plenary Session of the Thirtieth General Synod to order.

3. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. Black offered prayer to begin again our journey together towards deliberation and decision making today.

4. PRESENTATION ON SEMINARY EDUCATION

Ms. Artt introduced Ms. Alice Hunt, President of Chicago Theological Seminary, to present on the role of theological education in both leadership development and in helping to shape the discussion regarding the nature and future direction of the Church.

Ms. Hunt discussed theological formation as the bedrock of our mission. By taking an intentional approach to theology. Theological formation is happening in silos and needs to be federated across the denomination, vibrant leadership, academies in our Conferences, nationally, and in the Office for Faith Formation. Ms. Hunt challenged us to be a theological center. We are in this together. We in the UCC we have a unique and powerful message. We recognize in all its expressions and do cradle to grave. One UCC seminary with multiple campuses, utilizing distance learning to engage all! Closing challenge to the General Minister and President and leaders, convene leadership to discuss, plan and act on that challenge. Ms. Hunt challenged the new General Minister and President to look seriously at what it would look like if your denomination was the center for theological education.

5. HOUSEKEEPING ITEMS

Mr. Holeman addressed a couple of housekeeping matters. Mindful of Mr. Black's Prayer. Be mindful of each other's feelings. Extend the courtesy of those who may not see the issues the same as you. Only voting delegates are allowed to vote. State your name and your Conference.

15-GS-40 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted by acclamation to rescind the suspension of Rule 21b.

6. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE.

Ms. Sheldon Culver (IS) stated that it behooves us to pay attention to our goals and not delaying work by "word smithing" and remember we are in covenant.

7. PROPOSAL FOR AMENDMENT OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS.

Mr. Holeman called upon Mr. Wilson to move the adoption of the proposed Bylaw changes and amendments pertaining to governance.

Mr. Wilson moved the adoption of proposed amendments and revisions as voted upon by the Unified Board in March 2015. The proposed amendments to the Consitution and Bylaws were brought by the Governance Committee of the Board of Director and then approved by the Board of Directors and are in full compliance with all deadlines and notification protocols. Because the proposal comes from the Board Business Committee they need no second.

Mr. Wilson called upon Ms. Elizabeth Walker of the Governance Committee to provide details regarding the changes and referred the body to the summary and information sheets posted under materials of the General Synod 2015 website. Ms. Walker indicated the recommended changes are based on the reconfiguration of our National Setting with the creation of the Unified Board and the impact of recent re-organization undertaken in our National Offices as well as updates and clarifications of intent to reflect current meaning and process. Through input from MESA, we have proposed clarifications regarding the Ordination and Search and Call process as well as the continued relationship between members in discernment and those persons approved for ordination

pending call and our Committees on Church and Ministry. Proposed changes to the Unified Board Committee structure, specifically the proposed changes to the Executive Committee, came with the realization that the Executive Committee needed to be expanded to include all of the Chairs of the Standing Committees and representation of each class of the Board, and it also needed to reflect the diversity of our Church and of the Board. The elimination of the requirement to have specific covenanted ministry based committees was based on the general sense that the committee structure needed some adjustments, as the whole board is responsible for strategic planning and oversight, and that the assignment to ministry committees be left to the Board in conjunction with our leaders in the National Setting to best determine how the committee structure can best be utilized. There was a provision to allow the Board to call upon persons with expertise outside of the Board to serve on committees.

Discussion:

Ms. Angela Bileau (MASS) asked what the future of Justice and Witness Ministries was, addressing her question to Mr. Dorhauer to hear his commitment to Justice and Witness Ministries and the future. Mr. Dorhauer indicated that he will request that the position be held open and replaced at the time the current position is vacated in October.

Mr. Lawrence Richardson (MINN) spoke in favor of the changes.

Mr. Kevin Monroe (CAC) spoke against the changes.

Mr. Cameron Barr (IOWA) spoke in favor of the changes.

Ms. Dawn Garret Larson (NH) spoke against the changes.

Mr. Jacob Gardner (CONN) spoke in favor of the changes.

Ms. Yvonne Geld (SOC) spoke against the changes.

Mr. Adam Wynsinski (MASS) spoke in favor of the changes.

Ms. Kelly Parish Lucas (Disabilities Ministries) spoke against the changes.

Ms. Kim Wood (IL) spoke in favor of the changes.

Ms. Bernice Powell Jackson (Honored Guest) spoke against the changes.

Mr. John Dorhauer (Conference Minister Elect) spoke in favor of the changes.

Mr. Jorge Morales (ILL) spoke against the changes.

8. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. Jacob Gardner (CONN) asked for Authors of Open Letters calling for transparancies to identify themselves.

Mr. Emmery Groomes (SW) Called the Question and it was seconded.

15-GS-41 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod's vote to stop debate was defeated.

Discussion Continued:

Mr. Erin Lawer (MINN) spoke in favor of the changes. Mr. Graleyn Hager (MRSEJ) spoke against the changes.

Mr. Brian Beer (OHIO) aksed a question regarding process.

Ms. Donna Schapper (NY) asked a question regarding amendments.

- Ms. Molly Baskette (MASS) spoke in favor of the changes.
- Ms. Donna Schapper (NY) moved to postpone the Bylaws to the Thirty-first General Synod, and it was seconded. Ms. Schapper then spoke to it. She was concerned that people feel trusted enough with the process. It is not to slow down the change but find ways to bring people in together

Discussion on Motion to Postpone.

Mr. Jacob Gardner (CONN) objected to consideration of the amendment and spoke to it. Called to decide on the Bylaw changes to do and perform the business of the day. Spoke against a Motion to Postpone.

Mr. Ron Patterson (FLA) questioned what it means to accept the Motion for Postponement. Postpone would freeze frame what was decided today and bring it back in identical form in two years.

Moderator called the order of the day.

9. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. John Kendall (IL) asked for prayer to relieve the tension in the room.

Ms. Artt called the body to sing together "We are one in the Lord".

10. KEY NOTE SPEAKER MS. WINONA LADUKE

Ms. Artt introduced the speaker Ms. Winona LaDuke, an activist, environmentalist, economist and writer known for her work on tribal land claims and preservation.

Ms. LaDuke encouraged people to continue the good work. Work hard, pray hard. She thanked the Church for the work in rejecting the doctrine of discovery and thanks to the South Dakota Conference for returning land to the Lakota people. She encouraged us to honor the earth and shared what is being done in the Lakota communities. She spoke against fossil fuel, pipelines and destruction of the environment through fracking.

<u>11. RECOGNITION OF SOUTH DAKOTA CONFERENCE RETURNING LAND TO</u> <u>NATIVE AMERICANS</u>

Ms. Artt thanked the speaker and introduced Mr. Black and the Mr. David Gelton, Interim Conference Minister of the South Dakota Conference.

Mr. Black stated that last year he was privileged to be present at the South Dakota Conference Annual Meeting when the actual titles to church properties and adjacent lands in Nebraska and South Dakota were handed over to the Dakota Association. The ceremony was quite moving. The process of transferring the land has taken years, and it was gratifying to witness the culmination of the process, with the last of more than a dozen deeds transferred by the South Dakota Conference. These church land deeds were held by predecessor mission organizations of the UCC and transferred to the South Dakota Conference after the UCC was formed in 1957. The Conference has held those deeds for decades "in trust" on behalf of the Dakota Association. It wasn't until a few years ago that the Conference and Association began the process of transferring the lands.

In recent years, the leadership of Mr. Mark Stewart and Mr. David Felton has been instrumental in moving the land transfer process forward. Not only has it been an achievement for the Lakota people who are now in full possession of their land, it has also been the source of an increasingly positive and constructive relationship between the South Dakota Conference and the Dakota Association. This will make it possible for the incoming new Conference Minister, Mr. Gordon Rankin, to begin his tenure in South Dakota with an opportunity to build an even stronger relationship with the Lakota people, a relationship of mutuality, trust and equal partnership. A relationship free of the anger, frustration and both perceived and real paternalism and racism that have been impediments to right relationship in the past.

Mr. Felton thanked Mr. Black. Ms. Toni Buffalo, Ms. Mary Edlen and Mr. Bob Frieberg participated in the transfer ceremony of returning the last of the lands to the Lakota people.

12. RETURN TO THE ORDER OF THE DAY

Ms. Schaper (NY) asked to withdraw her Motion.

Mr. Holeman indicated the Motion to Postpone belongs to the House and then asked if there was any objection to withdraw the Motion to Postpone. There was objection so the house was called upon to vote on the withdrawal of the Motion.

15-GS-42 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted to withdraw the Motion to Postpone the Discussion of the Bylaw changes to the Thirty-first General Synod.

Discussion on original motion continued:

Mr. Patterson (FL) requested clarification of majority of what is being considered would require a two year discussion among the Conference. Mr. Holeman affirmed.

Ms. Erin Van (IS) spoke in favor of the changes.

Mr. Art Cribs (CA NV, S) spoke against the changes.

Ms. Edith Guffey (KO) spoke neither for nor against, but asked people to pray.

- Ms. Robin Bacon (CAC) requested clarification. Will Conference have a chance to vote? Ms. Walker indicated that it will be given a chance to give an up or down vote, but not make any changes.
- Mr. David Yoshita (CONN) spoke against the changes.
- Mr. Phil Porter (Coalition) requested clarification as to who are the Officers. Ms. Walker indicated the Executive Ministers would also be Officers of the Church. Model designed for flexibility.

Mr. Bob Thompson (SOC) Called the Question and it was seconded.

15-GS-43 VOTED: The Thirthieth General Synod voted to end debate on the Motion.

15-GS-44 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod denied the Motion on the Constitution and Bylaws proposals pertaining to Governance. (2/3 vote required: Yes-401; No-249; Abstain-23)

13. ADOPTION OF UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST BYLAWS RELATING TO THE INVESTMENT AND ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE

Mr. Holeman called upon Mr. Wilson to introduce the Second Motion Mr. Wilson moved the adoption of the United Church of Christ Bylaws relating to the Investment and Endowment Committee. Mr. Wilson deferred to Ms. Walker to speak to the Motion.

Ms. Walker spoke to the specific changes indicating that this amendment concerns the manner in which the Board sets the draw rate from the unrestricted funds in the endowment.

15-GS-45 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod voted in favor of the Proposed Amendment to the Bylaws regarding Investment and Endowment.

14. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE.

Mr. Black introduced the representatives of the United Church of Canada.

15. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Ms. Kelly Gallagher (CONN) requested the Board to consider arrangements to fill the Justice and Witness Ministries Executive Minister position and requested communication of the plans to the general body.

<u>16. RESOLUTION A CALL FOR THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST TO TAKE</u> <u>ACTIONS TOWARD A JUST PEACE IN THE ISRAELI-PALESTINIAN CONFLICT</u>

Mr. Holeman called on Mr. Richard Edom, Chairperson of committee, to present the recommended action of that committee. Mr. Edom moved that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ take actions toward a Just Peace in the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict. He, thereafter, spoke to the resolution.

Discussion: Mr. John Dekenbeck (CAC) spoke in favor of the resolution. Ms. Joann Marketto (PNE) spoke against the resolution.

17. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. Jacob Gardner (CONN) offered a prayer.

Mr. Graylan Hagler (MRSEJ) spoke in favor of the resolution. Ms. Dawn Berry (NH) spoke against the resolution.

Ms. Debby Spearman (SE) moved an amendment as follows:

"COMMENDS United Church of Christ leadership for continuing to dialogue with major Jewish organizations and call for United Church of Christ-wide participation in a rigorous dialogue among the three Abrahamic faiths at all levels – in particular between local congregations that will be resourced with materials from the Wider Church Global Ministries Middle East and Europe office that will identify ways in which groups of congregations in different faiths can work in concert to promote sacred reconciliation among all people who are affected by the conflict in the Middle East and to influence public policies in ways that will promote peace and social justice for Palestinians and Israelis and end violence in all its forms" Seconded by Lorrin Shepherd (FLA)

Discussion on Amendment: Ms. Marisa Brown Ludwig (MASS) spoke against the amendement. Ms. Diane Dulin (CPC) spoke in favor of the amendement.

15-GS-46 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted to approve the amendment to the the Motion.

Discussion continued on the main motion:

Mr. Matt Deal (PW) made an amendment which was addressed by Mr. Eden who indicated the fullness of the proposed amendment represents material changes to the Resolution and, therefore, Mr. Holeman ruled the amendment out of order.

Discussion resumed on the original resolution: Ms. Jeneen Kubala (OHIO) spoke against the motion.

Mr. Richard Waddell (ME) asked a question regarding voting on a previous amendment. There was a majority vote, so why was it defeated?

Mr. Holeman asked for a viewing of the vote tally again: 310 for; 271 against; and 87 abstained. Mr. Holeman indicated he stands corrected and the amendment passed.

Mr. Rick Pleva (IOWA) commented on abstentions. Do they count as yes? Mr. Holeman indicated that the answer to that question is No.

Mr. Holeman then called for discussion to continue on the Motion as amended.

Ms. Robin Bacon Huffman (CAC) spoke in favor of the resolution. Mr. Mark Pohlman (MASS) spoke against the resolution. Mr. Ryan Dowell Baum (IOWA) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Silas Tockey (IL) Called the Question and it was seconded.

15-GS-47 VOTED The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted to end debate on the amended motion.

18. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. Jim Antal (MASS) pointed out that it applies to everyone in every town, city and congregation in the United Church of Christ. If it passes, he is encouraging and urging everyone to make the personal commitment to stay in relationship with others of diverse faiths in and around your towns.

15-GS-48 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ approved the resolution calling for a call for the United Church of Christ to take Actions toward a Just Peace in the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict.

<u>A CALL FOR THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST TO TAKE ACTIONS TOWARD</u> <u>A JUST PEACE IN THE ISRAELI-PALESTINIAN CONFLICT</u>

WHEREAS, in 1985 the 15th General Synod of the United Church of Christ committed itself to be a Just Peace Church;

WHEREAS, historically the United Church of Christ has affirmed Israel's right to exist within secure and internationally recognized boundaries (GS 16[1987] and GS 18[1991]) and asserted the rights of Palestinians to enjoy sovereignty in an independent, contiguous, and viable state of their own, within secure and recognized boundaries (GS 16 [1987], GS 17[1989], and GS 18[1991];

WHEREAS, past General Synods have identified the Israeli occupation of Palestinian land and its human rights abuses committed therein to be a major source of conflict and have called for the end of the construction and expansion of settlements (GS 18 [1991] and GS 21[1997]);

WHEREAS, the various expressions of the United Church of Christ have a long history of effectively using boycotts against products and policies (lettuce, grapes, infant formula, apartheid, etc.) to address injustices;

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ is deeply committed to interfaith relationships and General Synods have confessed to the sin of anti-Semitism and proclaimed its renunciation (GS 23 [2001]) and have denounced actions against Islam or Muslims based on ignorance or fear (GS 28 [2011]);

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ has historically stressed the importance of living out a Covenantal theology, whereby diverse autonomous organizations covenant to collaborate for the common good, and that through such Covenantal relationships the United Church of Christ has partnered globally with those most impacted by the continuing conflict between Palestinians and Israel;

WHEREAS, as demonstrated through ongoing dialogue and partnerships, the United Church of Christ values and nurtures its relationships with Jewish groups in the U.S. and Israel who seek justice, equality, and freedom for both peoples, including groups with differing perspectives on the conflict;

WHEREAS, Palestinians in the West Bank have lived since 1967 under Israeli military occupation that subjects them to many human rights abuses, including: loss of their land for the purpose of building Israeli settlements; limited access to their land and to each other on account of the route of the Separation Wall on occupied Palestinian territories; systematic displacement into small, non-contiguous geographic enclaves separated by barriers and checkpoints; gross inequality in the amount of water allocated to them; severe and arbitrary travel restrictions; limited access to holy sites; segregated roads; demolition of their homes; destruction of their crops by settlers and the Israeli army; and arbitrary arrest, even of children;

WHEREAS, the Israeli government has once again subjected Palestinians in Gaza to military attacks using deadly force beyond that necessary for Israel's acknowledged need for self-defense and thereby beyond that measure of proportionate response permitted by historically Christian just war theory, has destroyed Gaza's infrastructure and economy, and has imposed: severe limits on personal entry and on the entry of products essential to Gazans' well-being; fishing limits in violation of international law and the Oslo accords; and strict control of electronic communications, as well as of air and sea space;

WHEREAS, Israel has annexed Palestinian East Jerusalem and separated it from the West Bank and Gaza and continues to appropriate Palestinian properties there for Jewish settlements and to deny building permits to Palestinians, as well as to revoke the residency rights of many of its Palestinian citizens there;

WHEREAS, Israel refuses to end, but rather has sought to solidify, its occupation of territory conquered in the 1967 War, leading to numerous illegal actions and human rights abuses by the Israeli government and military in defiance of United Nations resolutions, and refuses to respect the 4th Geneva Convention as called for by the International Court of Justice in its opinion concerning the Separation Wall in the occupied Palestinian territories;

WHEREAS, our Palestinian Christian partners, seeking an alternative to violence born of hopelessness and despair, have authored Kairos Palestine 2009 - 'A Moment of Truth': A Word of Faith, Hope, and Love from the Heart of Palestinian Suffering as a call and summons to their global partners to engage in non-violent measures that will pressure Israel to end the Occupation;

WHEREAS, the resolution "Concerning the Use of Economic Leverage in Promoting Peace in the Middle East," passed by the General Synod in 2005, calls upon "the Covenanted Ministries, Pension Boards, United Church Foundation, local churches and members to use economic leverage, including, but not limited to: advocating the reallocation of US foreign aid so that the militarization of the Middle East is constrained; making positive contributions to groups and

partners committed to the non-violent resolution of the conflict; challenging the practices of corporations that gain from the continuation of the conflict; and divesting from those companies that refuse to change their practice of gain from the perpetuation of violence, including the Occupation";

WHEREAS, despite years of corporate engagement and the submission of shareholder resolutions from United Church Funds and other religious and secular groups, few companies have withdrawn any of their operations that support the Occupation;

WHEREAS, many agencies, institutions, universities, and Christian denominations around the world are severing financial ties to companies or institutions that help sustain the Israeli occupation and now, notably, have been joined by various Jewish groups in the U.S., such as Jewish Voice for Peace and American Jews for a Just Peace-Boston, as well as Israeli groups, such as the Israeli Committee Against House Demolitions and Coalition of Women for Peace, that support using boycott and divestment strategies; and

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ's efforts to end the Occupation through economic leverage and advocacy for the protection of human rights of all Palestinians and Israelis are not aimed at isolating Israel or any other party but reflect the belief that engagement and communication among all affected by the current tragic situation in the Middle East are in the deepest interests of both Palestinians and Israelis;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ:

CALLS upon United Church of Christ churches and church members to study the Kairos Palestine document and take heed of its call for non-violent measures pressuring Israel to end the Occupation, in solidarity with the Palestinian people;

CALLS upon the United Church of Christ Board, the Pension Boards - United Church of Christ, Inc., United Church Funds, conferences, local churches, members, and other related United Church of Christ entities to divest any holdings in the following companies that have been found to profit from the occupation of the Palestinian territories by the state of Israel: Caterpillar Inc., Motorola Solutions, Hewlett-Packard Development Company LP or its successors, G4S, and Veolia Environment plus its subsidiaries;

CALLS upon the United Church of Christ Board to establish an advisory group composed of representatives from the stakeholders in this issue, with the specific assignment of developing and publishing standards by which faith-driven investment, divestment, and re-investment decisions can be made in the future;

CALLS upon all national entities of the church to boycott goods identified as produced in or using the facilities of illegal settlements located in the occupied Palestinian territories, including, but not limited to, Ahava skin care products, SodaStream products, and Hadiklaim dates; and upon church members to join boycotts of such goods in their local communities; CALLS upon the United Church of Christ Officers of the Church and church members to persist in the request to Congress, previously made by a number of religious leaders, to ensure that U.S. aid to Israel violates neither the U.S. Foreign Assistance Act, which prohibits assistance to any country that engages in a consistent pattern of human rights violations, nor the U.S. Arms Export Control Act, which limits the use of U.S. weapons to "internal security" or "legitimate self-defense";

COMMENDS United Church of Christ leadership for continuing to dialogue with major Jewish organizations and call for United Church of Christ-wide participation in a rigorous dialogue among the three Abrahamic faiths at all levels - in particular between local congregations – that will be resourced with materials from the Wider Church Global Ministries Middle East and Europe office that will identify ways in which groups of congregations of different faiths can work in concert to promote sacred reconciliation among all people who are affected by the conflict in the Middle East and to influence public policies in ways that will promote peace and social justice for Palestinians and Israelis and end violence in all its forms;

CALLS upon the United Church of Christ Board to monitor the implementation of this resolution by all United Church of Christ national entities and to ensure that those who manage the United Church Board's own invested funds and who provide United Church Board employee health and pension benefits are in compliance with the resolution; and

ASKS the General Minister and President to provide an annual report to the whole church on the implementation of this resolution, including a summary of interfaith dialogue at various levels, along with examples of interfaith, congregation-to-congregation peace efforts.

FUNDING

The funding for the implementation of the Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

<u>19. CALLING ON THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST TO RECOGNIZE THE ACTIONS OF ISRAEL AGAINST THE PALESTINIANS AS APARTHEID.</u>

Mr. Holeman called upon Mr. Bill Lyons (MI) to present the recommended action by the committee. Mr. Lyons indicated that the committee significantly expanded the text of the resolution while preserving the original intent and spirit in which it was submitted. On behalf of the committee, Mr. Lyons moved that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ adopt the resolution calling on the United Church of Christ to recognize the actions of Israel against the Palestinians as apartheid, as amended. Ms. Lyons then spoke the the resolution.

20. BUSINESS DICUSSION SUSPENDED

By concensus of the body, Mr. Holeman suspended the business discussion of the morning, indicating that debate and discussion would reconvene at 2:00 PM. He then introduced the Theological Reflector.

21. THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION

Mr. Laney brought a message about claiming the throne of the earth for Jesus Christ. He indicated that in our work for justice Jesus has already claimed the throne of this world and he encouraged everyone to be the body that God has called us to be in Jesus' name.

4. CONTINUATION OF CALLING ON THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST TO RECOGNIZE THE ACTIONS OF ISRAEL AGAINST THE PALESTINIANS AS APARTHEID.

15-GS-49 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted to terminate debate. Motion Carried. Debate Closed.

15-GS-50 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted on the resolution as amended by the committee Calling on the United Church of Christ to recognize the actions of Israel against the Palestinians as Apartheid. Motion Failed (Resolution of Witness 2/3rds majority required 312 for; 295 against; 31 abstentions)

5. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. Art Cribbs (CA NV S) called on the UCC to be an open and welcoming community of communication to all racial lines; to begin to listen more carefully to the voices of the people who are not heard. Mr. Cribbs invited people to be more intentional in conversations, in opening ourselves for the diversity and differences that are a reality in our time.

6. RESPONSIBLE STEWARDSHIP OF THE OUTER SPACE ENVIRONMENT

Mr. Holeman called on Ms. Ruth Bradshaw (KO) Chair of the committee to present the recommended action of the committee to the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ. Ms. Bradshaw reported on the resolution and moved that the body adopt and approve the resolution as amended. She then spoke to the resolution as amended by committee.

Discussion:

Mr. Roger Ulrich (PSE) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Mr. Bob Bachelder (MASS) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Ms. Bryn Smallwood-Garcia (CONN) spoke against the resolution.

Mr. Alexander Hanes (SD) wanted to hear the amendment. Moderator indicated there is no amendment.

Mr. Derek Obrien (CONN) Called the Question and it was sSeconded.

15-GS-51 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted to terminate debate. Motion Carried. Debate Closed. Voting in Favor of termination of debate.

15-GS-52 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted in favor of the motion as amended by committee calling for responsible stewardship of the outer space environment.

RESPONSIBLE STEWARDSHIP OF THE OUTER SPACE ENVIRONMENT

WHEREAS previous General Synods of the United Church of Christ have acknowledged humanity's moral obligation to be faithful stewards of God's creation; and

WHEREAS the United Church of Christ's pastoral letter on faith and science provides a theological basis for enlarging our ethical perspective on creation to incorporate outer space; and

WHEREAS a sustainable space environment is necessary for many activities essential to human flourishing; and

WHEREAS the long-term sustainability of the space environment is at risk from space debris and irresponsible conduct; and

WHEREAS timely action is required to stabilize the space environment, particularly low Earth orbit.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ praises God for the majesty, mystery and complexity of the whole of creation, from the Earth to the outer reaches of the universe, and acknowledges human responsibility for the stewardship of planet Earth, its ecosystems and the larger cosmological systems of which it is a part. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ expresses its concern about the pollution and degradation of the outer space environment and its dangerous implications for humanity and all of God's creation;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ requests that Justice and Witness Ministries recommend educational materials for the churches on the subject of outer space sustainability;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ requests that educational materials recommended by Justice and Witness Ministries be presented to the Thirty-First General Synod with suggestions for how the United Church of Christ might undertake various forms of action;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ requests that Justice and Witness Ministries send copies of this resolution and supporting materials to its global ecumenical, interfaith, and civil society partners and invite them to join the United Church of Christ in its efforts to promote outer space sustainability;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ calls upon the members of the United Church of Christ to educate themselves on this issue and advocate with members of Congress to adequately fund NASA to lead the nations of the world in working together to reduce the volume of debris in low Earth orbit;

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED THAT the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ expresses its support for efforts by the United States and other nations to negotiate international agreements that encourage responsible behavior in space.

FUNDING

Funding for the implementation of this Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Officers of the Church, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

7. RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT LEGISLATION REQUIRING LABELING OF GENETICALLY ENGINEERED FOODS ON FOOD PACKAGING.

Mr. Holeman called upon Mr. David Nelson (IOWA) Chair of the committee to present the recommended action of the committee to the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ. Mr. Nelson reviewed the amendements and recommended approval of the resolution as amended by committee. He also spoke to the resolution.

8. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. Jacob Garner (CONN) objected to consideration of the resolution, stating that standing rules give authority to object when the text of a resolution brings into question the Christian faith. Ruled out of order by Moderator, but advised to bring his objection at an "Against" microphone.

Mr. Paul Clay (CA NV, S) Called the Question, and it was seconded.

15-GS-53 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted to terminate debate. Motion Carried. Debate Closed. Voting in favor of terminating debate.

15-GS-54 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted to reject the resolution as amended. It was a resolution of witness and required a 2/3 vote. (310 for, 296 against; 28 abstentians). Motion failed.

9. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Ms. Jaramillo said a word of thanks for the 2,936 signatures regarding Racism in Baseball to the Cleveland Baseball Team. Celebrate Supreme Court Decision related to the affordable care act. Thank the US Court for looking beyond politics.

10. REAFFIRMING OUR COMMITMENT TO FULL EQUALITY FOR PERSONS OF ANY SEXUAL ORIENTATION, GENDER IDENTITY OF GENDER EXPRESSION.

Mr. Holeman called on Ms. Ruth Bradshaw (KO), Chair of the committee to present the recommended action of the committee to the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ. Ms. Bradshaw indicated that the committee was requesting permission to offer a substitute resolution to the body in order to capture the intent and meaning of the original resolution, and that it required a change in the name of the resolution.

Mr. Holeman indicated introducing a substitute resolution and a name change required a vote of acceptance by the body. He then asked for discussion or debate and there was none.

15-GS-55 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted to accept the substitute resolution entitled Reaffirming our Commitment to Full Equality for Persons of any Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity or Gender Expression to replace the original resolution entitled Our Commitment to Full Equality for LGBT Persons.

Ms. Bradshaw spoke to the resolution and called on the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ to adopt the resolution as substituted and amended by Committee.

Mr. Louis Mitchell (MASS) spoke in favor of the resolution.Mr. Bob Thompson (SOC) spoke against the resolution.Mr. Jacob Gardner (CONN) spoke in favor of the resolution.Mr. Chris Davies (COALITION) spoke in favor of the resolution.

Ms. Katherine Howe (NH) Call the Question and it was seconded.

15-GS-55 VOTED. The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted to terminate debate. Motion Carried. Debate Closed. Voting in Favor of termination of debate.

15-GS-56 VOTED. The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted in favor of the motion as substituted and amended by committee calling Reaffirming our Commitment to Full Equality for Persons of any Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity or Gender Expression.

REAFFIRMING OUR COMMITMENT TO FULL EQUALITY FOR PERSONS OF ANY SEXUAL ORIENTATION, GENDER IDENTITY OF GENDER EXPRESSION.

WHEREAS, General Synod and other settings of the United Church of Christ have repeatedly advocated for the equal rights and dignity of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender persons (LGBT) in the United States and abroad, and

WHEREAS, the United Church of Christ, in partnership with other churches and faith traditions, has played a key role in the passage of laws protecting the basic civil rights of protecting persons of any sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, including the right to marry, and

WHEREAS, a new political movement is advocating in many states for legislation that aims to establish broad "religious exemptions" from existing or future laws protecting the equal rights of persons of any sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, and

WHEREAS, these laws could allow restaurant owners to refuse service to customers of any sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, landlords to refuse leases to tennants of any sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, and other forms of discrimination against persons of any sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ reaffirms its commitment to the full legal protection of the civil rights of all persons regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity and expression,

CALLS upon congregations and all settings of the United Church of Christ to advocate for enactment of local, state and federal laws protecting persons of any sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression against discrimination in public accommodations, housing and employment, CALLS upon congregations and all settings of the United Church of Christ to advocate on the basis of faith against legislation or executive actions that aim to establish a broad "religious exemption" to existing or future laws protecting the equal rights of persons of any sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, and

REAFFIRMS the historic commitment of this church to religious freedom, to the right of all churches and faith communities to maintain and advocate for their own beliefs and practices, and to respectful dialogue within the United Church of Christ and with other faith communities on issues concerning human sexuality, human dignity and marriage.

FUNDING

Funding for the implementation of this Resolution will be made in accordance with the overall mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Collegium of Officers, in consultation with appropriate ministries or other entities within the United Church of Christ, will determine the implementing body.

11. POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE

Mr. Don Hart (Business Committee) requested the body to celebrate the beginning of ministry of the new Executive of CHHSM, Mr. Michael Readinger, and new Executive of the Pension Board, Mr. Brian Bodager, welcoming them as leaders of the Church.

12. RECOGNITION OF NATIONAL STAFF

Mr. Holeman called the order of the day so the national staff could be recognized.

Mr. Holeman invited all national staff members to join him on the stage. He then invited everyone to formally express their appreciation to the staff, including those who work with the Pension Boards and the United Church Funds. The delegates and visitors responded with a standing ovation.

Mr. Black thanked staff on behalf of the Collegium.

13. TRANSITION FROM FOSSIL FUELS TO RENEWABLE ENERGY

Mr. Holeman called on Mr. Aaron Roberts (KO) Chairperson of the committee to present the recommended action of the committee to the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ. Mr. Roberts presented the resolution as amended by the committee and recommended that the body adopt the resolution as amended. Mr. Roberts also spoke to the resolution.

Discussion: Mr. David Shanks (IS) spoke against the resolution. Mr. Jim Antal (MASS) spoke in favor of the resolution. Mr. Bill Lochstet (PC) spoke in favor of the resolution. Mr. John Pawlowski (IS) proposed an Amendment, to be added as a final "Be It Further Resolved". Proposal was seconded by Mr. R. J. Morgan (IS).

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that it is our belief that the transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy is among the most compelling and urgent moral issues of our times that although some political and technological advance may take time, that way progress can be achieved more immediate that the UCC move with all deliberate speed to champion those objectives and the UCC may not only insist upon swift and measurable action among state and federal governments, but that it model these commitments in all of its religious and administrative buildings, as well as its expenditures and allocations of resources and that we encourage other ecumenical partners do the same."

Discussion on the amendment: Mr. John Lof (IOWA) spoke in favor of the amendment. Mr. Emmery Groomes (SW) spoke in favor of the amendment.

There was no opposition, so by consensus the amendment was voted on.

15-GS-57 VOTED. The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted in favor of the first amendment to the resolution.

Ms. Karen Wells (WIS) and Ms. Heidi Hackman (WIS) brought a second amendment to the resolution, requesting that the date of 2080 in the first WHEREAS paragraph be changed from 2080 to 2040.

Mr. Ian Whinham (CONN) spoke in opposition to the amendment.

Ms. Karen Wells (WIS) spoke in favor of the amendment.

Mr. Scott Brooks-Cope (PNE) spoke in favor of the amendment.

Mr. John Parkyn (WIS) Spoke in opposition to the amendment

Mr. Jim Antal (MASS) spoke in favor of the amendment.

Mr. Jacob Gardner (CONN) spoke in opposition to the amendment.

Mr. Bradley Thomas (CAC) spoke in favor of the amendment.

Ms. Kelly Napier (SC) Called the Question, and it was seconded.

15-GS-58 VOTED. The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted in favor of ending debate on the second amendement to the resolution.

15-GS-59 VOTED. The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted in favor of the amendment to change the date in the first WHEREAS from 2080 to 2040.

Discussion on Original Motion as amended: Mr. David Pattee (OHIO) Called the Question and it was seconded.

15-GS-60 VOTED. The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted in favor of ending debate on the original resolution as amended.

15-GS-61 VOTED. The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted in favor of the resolution on Transition from Fossil Fuels to Renewable Energy, as amended by committee and as amended twice by the Thirtieth General Synod.

TRANSITION FROM FOSSIL FUELS TO RENEWABLE ENERGY

WHEREAS, the use of any fossil fuel, including coal, natural gas and oil, results in an increase of carbon dioxide and other dangerous greenhouse gasses in the atmosphere, which causes global warming and climate change, such that if we do not immediately decrease our use of these fuels, and completely eliminate them by the year 2040 all life on earth will likely experience previously unknown devastating results including drought, wildfires, extreme precipitation and cyclones, drinking water scarcity, diminished food production, population migrations, human mortality, violent conflicts, and species extinction, thereby upsetting the whole ecology of Earth; and

WHEREAS, feasibility studies indicate that transitioning to all renewable energy like wind, solar, and hydro, is not only possible but economically desirable; and

WHEREAS, nonrenewable fossil fuel extraction continues to be subsidized by our government, while at the same time, renewable energy sources are significantly under-supported, resulting in the de-emphasis of critical renewable energy development; and

WHEREAS, investment in extensive infrastructures supporting the fossil fuel industries and especially the fracking (horizontal slickwater hydraulic fracturing) industry precludes investment, invention, introduction, development and employment opportunities essential for building a renewable energy future; and

WHEREAS, the United States contains large subterranean supplies of natural gas and oil in underground rock formations far beneath the earth's surface in which natural gas and oil extraction is being considered or in which natural gas and oil extraction is already occurring by the process known as fracking; which uses millions of gallons of water, often mixed with sand and toxic chemicals, some of which returns to the surface contaminated and sometimes radioactive and has led to contamination of air, surface and other underground water resources, and has also caused earthquakes; and

WHEREAS, hydraulic fracturing has an impact on individuals and communities, including such justice issues as the use of "forced pooling," private vs public practices of eminent domain, concerns about worker safety, illegal dumping, and environmental racism issues including siting of waste disposal facilities in or near low-income communities of color; and

WHEREAS, the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ, recognizing that there is a wide range of stances on the issues of climate change, fossil fuels, hydraulic fracturing and renewable energy among its members and that these issues have the potential to be divisive within the body of Christ, still and all understands that the gospel is the permission and the commandment to enter difficulty with hope; and

WHEREAS, although we understand the pull of immediate, short-term, economic and political necessities, as people of faith we answer a higher call, which is to have a deep moral obligation to be good stewards of God's creation so that all humans, other creatures and future generations may thrive on clean air, clean water, and clean soil.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ place itself on moral record and implore its pastors, conferences and members to advocate with federal and state lawmakers to enact or extend incentives and renewable portfolio standards that will lead to the rapid transition to renewable energy sources, energy conservation and energy efficiency measures worldwide, with a goal of total transition as soon as possible but no later than 2080; eliminate immediately all fossil fuel subsidies; enact some form of a carbon tax; enact legislation that will eliminate as quickly as possible any further extraction of coal, oil and gas nationally or internationally, particularly by corporations chartered in the United States; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod implore its pastors, conferences and members to advocate with federal and state lawmakers to enact an immediate ban on all gas and oil well hydraulic fracturing; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod, through its General Minister and President convey our concerns about fossil fuels and hydraulic fracturing in writing, including a copy of this resolution, to all governors, appropriate regulatory agencies, and state and federal elected officials, and to all appropriate denominational instrumentalities informing them of the United Church of Christ's position, and implore its pastors and members to send this resolution to state and federal elected representatives; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod requests that Justice and Witness Ministries, through its Minister for Environmental Justice, establish a national task force and report back to all future General Synods the progress on all imperatives listed in this resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod encourage conferences to establish task forces working in conjunction with the Minister for Environmental Justice, as appropriate, to study, monitor, and report to the churches on justice issues relating to fossil fuel use and hydraulic fracturing--including but not limited to climate change; ecological protections of our lands, air, and water; dangers to public health and welfare; impacts on communities around issues such as crime and violence, housing, education, etc.; and that these task forces be charged with educating and organizing congregants in their decision-making and actions around these issues, and that such task forces also listen to the people in the pews with deep intent to hear the moral dilemmas facing our members about the relationship between the short term and the longer term implications; and be it finally

RESOLVED, that the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ invites and encourages its members to inform and educate themselves about the issues pertaining to fossil fuel use, hydraulic fracturing, climate change and renewable energy by assessing personal and congregational carbon footprints and engaging in humble and open grassroots conversation, with particular sensitivity to energy consumption patterns and to our most vulnerable citizens, those without sufficient income to meet daily needs, as well as the long-term needs for energy that all face; in the sharing of pertinent stories about the impasse that our dependency on non-renewable energy resources discloses; and in workshops and study groups that discern and express the theological, moral, economic and personal facets of the enterprises of fossil fuel use and hydraulic fracturing, with the above conversations designed to yield a renewable form of spiritual and moral energy to resolve our physical energy needs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that it is our belief that the transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy is among the most compelling and urgent moral issues of our times that although some political and technological advance may take time, that way progress can be achieved more immediate that the UCC move with all deliberate speed to champion those objectives and the UCC may not only insist upon swift and measurable action among state and federal governments, but that it model these commitments in all of its religious and administrative buildings, as well as its expenditures and allocations of resources and that we encourage other ecumenical partners do the same.

<u>14. POINT OF PRIVILEGE:</u>

Mr. Fritz Gilmore (RM) and Mr. Luke Grobe (RM) suggest finding a way to do more compassionate and open conversation where all are prayerfully in conversation on how we can be in community with the resolutions. Try something new stepping forward with the good work, but believe that there are new ways that allow for our Church to do business.

15. INVITATION TO THE THIRTY-FIRST GENERAL SYNOD

Mr. Holeman shared that in two years, the General Synod will convene in the city of Baltimore, Maryland and the Central Atlantic Conference will host our gathering. He then called on Conference Minister, Mr. John Deckenback to extend the invitation.

(Video was shown.) Mr. Deckenback (CAC) extended a warm welcome to Baltimore and presented Mr. Holeman with a symbol of appreciation. He asked for prayers for Central Atlantic Conference by the body of the UCC as they prepare for healing as a community and prayer for restoration and celebration.

16. THANKS AND RECOGNITION OF THE LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS COMMITTEE

The Moderator called on Mr. Foley, Administrator of General Synod, for a word of thanks to our Local Arrangements Committee and volunteers from the Ohio Conference. Three hundred fifty-three volunteers participated.

The delegates responded with a standing ovation. Mr. Foley also expressed appreciation to the Youth Stewards who were still on the floor as well as the Co-chairs of the Local Arrangements Committee Ms. Sue Wimer and Mr. Derry Wimer.

<u>17. THANKS TO OTHER STAFF:</u>

Mr. Holeman took the opportunity to thank the General Synod Administrator, Lee Foley, and his marvelous staff: Ms. Valerie Smith, Ms. Tina Villa, Ms. Jan Gomoll, Ms. Denise Shimell, and Ms. Christine Lucarelli, for all of their hard work in putting together this fantastic General Synod experience. There was a standing ovation of appreciation.

18. ANNOUNCEMENTS AND FINAL REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR

Mr. Foley indicated that the Registrar for the Thirtieth General Synod reported 3,134 registrants for the meeting. There were nearly 4,000 through the building over the last five days.

Mr. Holeman called on Mr. Wilson, Mr. Moos, Mr. Guess, Mr. Walter John Boris, Ms. Rita Root and Ms. Bonds to assist with the release of Mr. Black and Ms. Jaramillo from their duties as Excutive Minister of Justice and Witness Ministries and General Minister and President respectfully. The ceremony was concluded with a prayer by Mr. Dorhauer.

20. INSTALLATION OF NEW MODERATOR/ASSISTANT MODERATOR

Mr. Holeman stated that, as we come to the end of the General Synod, we pause now to recognize and affirm the ministry of those we have elected to lead the United Church of Christ. Before you are the Moderator-elect and Assistant Moderator-elect of the United Church of Christ.

21. FINAL THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION

Mr. Holeman invited Ms. Rosas for her reflections on this General Synod experience, and also said a word of thanks to the Theological Reflectors for all they have shared in our time together.

The delegates expressed their appreciation with a standing ovation.

22. ADJOURNMENT

Mr. Holeman, on behalf of the Moderators, expressed thanks and appreciation for everyone's participation and commitment to our denomination and the Church of Jesus Christ. He then called on Mr. Wilson, Chair of the Board of Directors, for the final motion.

Mr. Wilson moved the adjournment of the Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ at the conclusion of this evening's worship service.

15-GS-68 VOTED: The Thirtieth General Synod of the United Church of Christ voted to adjourn at the conclusion of this evening's worship service.

The Moderator, Mr. Holeman, gaveled the final business session of the Thirtieth General Synod to a close.

APPENDIX A

REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

Thank you, Mr. Moderator.

Good Afternoon.

I'm Carol Burke from the Western Reserve Association of the Ohio Conference and I serve as the Chair of your Credentials Committee.

The committee is comprised of 10 delegates, in two classes, and our job is to monitor the composition of the Conference Delegations to the General Synod, for their compliance with the diversity requirements as laid down in the UCC Bylaws.

In May, 2014, Jan Gomoll and I met and arranged to send letters to those individual Conference delegations who the Credentials Committee Class of 2013 felt were not in compliance with the spirit of the Bylaws at the Long Beach General Synod 29. They were contacted and advised that improvement was needed.

The Credentials Committee has met twice in recent months, first by conference call earlier this year, when we reviewed preliminary data from the Synod Registrar. At the conclusion of that meeting, we again directed Jan Gomoll to be in contact with those Conference delegations that we found to be struggling to achieve compliance. Yesterday, we met for the second time, and reviewed the Final Report of the Registrar, dated June 22, 2015, yet we realize that changes in delegate registration were being made as late as this morning.

We can report that the Delegation-as-a-whole has met and exceeded the Bylaws requirement that 20% of the Delegates are 30 years of age or under. Our ratio of Lay Persons to Clergy is almost a perfect 50%, as the Bylaws require. The Bylaws also require that the Delegation-as-a Whole should reflect the United Church of Christ's commitment to affirmative action, with regard to racial and ethnic persons defined as Blacks, Hispanics, American Indians, Asian Americans, and Pacific Islanders. The 2014 census conducted by the UCC Center for Analytics Research and Data reports that 13% of our church membership falls into our racial or ethnic categories. The Credentials Committee is pleased to report that this General Synod's Delegation-as-a-Whole exceeds that threshold with 17% racial or ethnic persons registered as delegates.

The Credentials Committee noted that the Bylaws require not fewer than 675 nor more than 725 conference delegates. As of June 22, there were only 659 registered conference delegates.

The Credentials Committee would like to present these comments to the Delegation-as-a-Whole.

1. We suggest that the cultural/ethnic categories that we use when delegates register for General Synod should be the same as those categories that are used by our Center for Analytics Research and Data. This would enable our ability to more accurately compare Delegation-as-a-Whole percentages to those compiled by the Center.

2. The Credentials Committee should have access to Delegation-as-a-Whole data from previous synods, thus allowing comparison and determination of how the face of the UCC is evolving.

3. We challenge the membership of the United Church of Christ and its Bylaws to move beyond its commitment to affirmative action and become fully inclusive and assessable to all historically under-represented groups, increasing the minority voices who represent who we are as a denomination from the 17% diversity of this General Synod 2015 to 20% diversity at our next General Synod.

Yes, there are areas where individual Conference delegations are not in compliance with the spirit of the UCC Bylaws, and they will contacted and advised improvement is needed, but it is my privilege to report to you that the Conferences of the United Church of Christ have made a good-faith effort to provide the diversity required by the UCC Bylaws. Therefore, the Credentials Committee has certified the Delegation-as-a-Whole of General Synod 2015 to be in compliance with the UCC Bylaws requirements.

-We will try not to formulate what we want to say while someone else is speaking,

-Welcome and regard each other as equals with our own unique gifts and graces,

-We will seek clarification if needed,

-Speak in truth and love,

-Be open to new learnings from various perspectives,

-Share our concerns in a spirit of love and respect in keeping with Jesus' teaching,

-Focus on ideas and suggestions instead of questioning people's motives, intelligence, or integrity,

-Speak for ourselves only, expressing our own thoughts and feelings, referring to our experiences,

-We will avoid broad generalizations,

-Maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace,

-Seek to stay in community with each other though the discussion may be vigorous or full of tension,

-We will be ready to forgive and be forgiven,

-We will include those who should be involved in discussions even if we disagree with them, -Support and abide by the decision of the majority even if we disagree with it, and if we disagree with it and wish to change it, work for that change in ways which are consistent with these guidelines,

-Include our disagreements in our prayers, not praying for the triumph of our viewpoints, but seeking God's grace to listen attentively, to speak clearly, and to remain open to the vision God holds for us all.

UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST BOARD REPORT OF THE CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER GENERAL SYNOD 2015




On Tuesday, July 2, 2013, the directors of the new United Church of Christ Board met for the first time in Long Beach, California. During this first meeting, board members expressed concern about the financial viability of the National Setting and the level of the draw rates ... and so began the work of the financial committees including the Finance and Budget, the Investment and Endowment, the Audit and the Development Committees.


The Investment and Endowment Committee, which includes board members as well as non-board members with investment expertise, determined that establishing a draw rate without adequate time to conduct research and discuss the ramifications of any recommendations would be premature for budget year 2014 and gave authorization to the Office of the General Minister and President and the three Covenanted Ministries (Justice & Witness Ministries, Local Church Ministries and Wider Church Ministries) to present their budgets using the spending policies that had been previously adopted by their respective predecessor boards for 2014.

Upon completion of research on spending policies and draw rates, and holding multiple conversations regarding the spending policies with the Collegium and the full Board, the Investment and Endowment Committee has recommended to the United Church of Christ Board a draw rate of 5% for budget year 2015 with a goal of attaining a 4% draw rate by 2019. Their work is now focused on developing the United Church of Christ Board's Investment Policy.

The chart below provides information on draw rates over a ten year period (2006 through 2015). The combined draw rates (on a weighted average basis) have ranged from a high of 6.33% to the new norm of 5% or below:



On an individual ministry basis, the average rates over the same time period range from 4.93% to 10.91%:



The Finance and Budget Committee held multiple conference calls and meetings to discuss the budgets and develop a new model for allocating basic support. Like the Investment and Endowment Committee, the Finance and Budget Committee expressed concern about the level of the draws across the ministries. The Committee heard from the Collegium about the ramifications of reducing expenses without determining the mission priorities of the National Setting first and the Committee and the full board encouraged the Collegium to develop a plan for the future structure and support of the National Setting.

The 2014 Combined Budget which included the Office of the General Minister & President (combining the former Executive Council and Office of General Ministries operating revenues and expenses), Justice & Witness Ministries, Local Church Ministries and Wider Church Ministries was presented with an average draw rate of 6.63%, or an additional draw of \$2.3 million over the policy base of \$7.6 million. The Finance and Budget Committee recommended approval of the budget as presented with the stipulation that the Collegium enact their plan to begin reducing expenses and increase revenue throughout 2014 to achieve a balanced budget.

Actual results for the year ended December 31, 2014 were significantly different than budget, reflecting the decisions of the Collegium to act judiciously in reducing staff, overhead and program expenses in order to address the excessive draw rates immediately. While the actual draw rate (2014 actual was 4.87%) is to be celebrated and commended, the impact of the budget reductions affected staff as 13 positions were eliminated through a reduction in force. In addition, several open positions were not filled. The work of the eliminated positions was absorbed by other staff as necessary to maintain the infrastructure of the National Setting and ensure meetings such as General Synod maintained their high quality.

On a combined basis, 2014 closed with a surplus of \$290,000 against the budgeted deficit of \$2.3 million.

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Our Church's Wider Mission-National Basic Support is currently allocated on a different formula than in the past. Practice between the July, 2000 restructure and the 2013 budget year had been to use the basic support percentage allocations approved for the new structure by General Synod in 1999 with adjustments for amounts taken off the top such as support for General Synod, grants to ecumenical partners, grants to the historically underrepresented groups and expenses of the Executive Council. All of those grants and expenses previously deducted from the projected basic support for a given year prior to allocating to the Pension Boards and the Covenanted Ministries are still deducted before allocations and are now included in the budget of the Office of the General Minister and President.

The new model of allocating basic support adopted by the United Church of Christ Board after consideration and recommendation by the Finance and Budget Committee deducts certain historic commitments and support for General Synod, then applies the Pension Boards percentage of National Basic Support that was approved in 2013 to the projected revenue. After these two calculations, the remainder is allocated based upon the proportionate net budgeted revenues and expenses of the Office of the General Minister and President (OGMP) and the Covenanted Ministries. This new methodology adjusts for annual changes in discretionary revenues and expenses amongst the OGMP and the Covenanted Ministries and equalizes the draw rates amongst the four entities.

In order to compare and contrast the old method with the new, the 2013 allocation as approved by the former Executive Council and the 2015 allocation as approved by the United Church of Christ Board are included in the Supplemental Information section.

The other financial committees of the United Church of Christ Board have also accomplished much since the Board's first meeting in July, 2013:


The Audit Committee reviewed and received the 2013 audited financial statements of the United Church of Christ Board, approved updated Conflict of Interest and Whistleblower Policies for the Board and the Committee determined that their due diligence requirement is to identify the best service capability and overall value of audit firms that could potentially provide audit services to the National Setting so a time period has been established for requesting proposals from firms on a periodic basis. The Audit Committee will meet prior to General Synod to review the 2014 audited financial statements and will be reviewing proposals from audit firms in September for the 2015 audit.

The Development Committee has worked to implement a gift acceptance policy on behalf of the United Church of Christ Board which sets forth a formal framework within which the organization will accept gifts of cash, pledges, securities, real estate, planned gifts, etc., all consistent with the mission of the United Church of Christ. The Development Committee has recommended the convening of a Task Force on Giving, which the United Church of Christ Board has now convened. The work of the Task Force is to examine the covenant of giving across the life of the United Church of Christ in order to ensure the discovery, implementation and utilization of a more effective and efficient development program, and to inform the future direction of the church's pattern of giving. The Task Force is charged with examining and reporting to the United Church of Christ Board and the 2017 General Synod:

- The current philosophy of giving among the various entities of the church;
- Our Church's Wider Mission, the covenantal agreement, retention rates, and relevancy in the life of the various expressions of the church;
- Alternative models of covenantal financial partnership;
- The established Pattern of Giving, its relevancy and viability'
- The Special Mission Offerings as presently organized and allocated relative to the needs of the church, OCWM and the Pattern of Giving.

<u>Our Church's Wider Mission-Basic Support and Special Mission Offerings</u> Our Church's Wider Mission—both Basic Support and the Special Mission Offerings accounted for approximately 43% of 2014 revenues that supported the work of the Office of the General Minister and President and the Covenanted Ministries.

As stated in past reports and shown on the graph below, Basic Support continues to decline with the trend expected to continue over the next several years although at a slower rate than has been experienced in the past. The graph presented below shows a 10-year history of National Basic Support receipts.



At this General Synod, delegates will be asked to approve a National Basic Support base of \$6.007 million and \$5.785 million for 2016 and 2017, which will impact the budgets for the United Church of Christ Board and the Pension Boards. These figures represent a decrease from the 2015 budget (\$6.190 million) of \$183,000 or 2.96% for 2016 and a decrease between 2016 and 2017 of \$222,000 or 3.84%.

General Synod delegates will also be asked to recommend that the allocations to the Office of the General Minister and President, the Covenanted Ministries and the Pension Boards be referred to the United Church of Christ Board since under the new model of allocations, the allocations cannot be calculated until preliminary, discretionary revenue and expenses are calculated for the budget year for the Office of the General Minister and President and the Covenanted Ministries.

The intention of this report is to provide additional historical data and the 2015 mission spending plan. The 2015 Mission Spending Plan presented below includes the basic support allocation to and Christmas Fund receipts of the Pension Boards. These two revenue sources and related expenditures represent only a portion of the Pension Boards' actual revenues and expenses.

Sources and uses are also provided in graph format in the Supplemental Information section. The programs have been combined into a grand total for the charts.

THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST BOARD

is called to perform all legal functions of the General Synod when General Synod is not in session. This governing board is responsible for strategic planning and policymaking. Working with the General Minister and President, it is responsible for the ecumenical and interfaith relations of the United Church of Christ in the National Setting. The members of the United Church of Christ Board serve as the directors of each of the Covenanted Ministries.

The administrative functions of United Church of Christ Board are accounted for under the Office of the General Minister and President and include general synod, philanthropy and stewardship, publications and communication, conference and ecumenical relationships and general counsel.

This board faithfully used mission support of \$7,211,718 in 2014 and will use \$7,047,524 in 2015. Mission support includes \$3,477,029 given through Our Church's Wider Mission Basic and Special Support in 2014. The projection for 2015 is \$4,226,467.

Our Administration Ministries will require \$1,528,174 this year.

The General Minister and President (the Rev. Geoffrey A. Black), working with other staff, provides spiritual leadership for the whole church, guiding the visioning and planning necessary for faithful church life through continuing testament, extravagant welcome and changing lives.

The office of the Chief Administrative Officer (Mr. Lee Foley), working with other staff, facilitates the work of and helps plan the General Synod in cooperation with the General Synod Program and Planning Committee, conferences, and local church leadership. The Chief Administrative Officer serves as Secretary of the United Church of Christ Board and carries the day-to-day responsibility for the overall work of the office, including certain Common Services teams.

Administration also includes the cost of board meetings for the United Church of Christ Board and any special task forces as appointed by the Board.

Our Office of Philanthropy and Stewardship will require \$1,398,052 this year.

Our program reaches out to the whole church in partnership with all of the Covenanted Ministries, inviting and receiving major gifts and planned gifts that extend the church's outreach and supporting generous philanthropy across all expressions of the church. Included in the Office of Philanthropy and Stewardship are expenses associated with the development of congregational mission support resources, Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) promotion, grants and scholarships and stewardship. Capital Campaign Services staff works closely with the staff of the Office however their expenses are accounted for by the Church Building and Loan Fund.

Our Program & Grants Ministries will require \$4,121,298 this year.

Our program includes expenses associated with General Synod. These expenses are supported through annual allocations from Our Church's Wider Mission-Basic Support and Registration Fees.

Our program includes grants to ecumenical ministries, historical councils and to groups that are part of the Council for Racial and Ethnic Ministries.

Our program includes expenses associated with the Office of General Counsel which is responsible for the wide range of legal issues throughout all settings of the church. This office is financially supported in part by the Conferences of the United Church of Christ.

Our program includes the church's essential task of proclaiming the Gospel in and through our church as our story is told within and beyond the UCC:

- The UCC's social media presence has expanded rapidly. We have 80,000 Facebook followers, with our most popular posts reaching up to 4 million people, and we have nearly 10,000 followers on Twitter.
- The UCC web site welcomes more than 1.3 million visitors each year; half of these visitors as brand-new visitors to the site.
- The UC News team produces more than 300 stories each year, published UC News outlets, and places stories in the mainstream media, including *The Washington Post*, *The New York Times*, *Huffington Post*, *The Christian Century*, Religion News Service and the Associated Press.
- *Keeping You Posted*, the denomination's weekly e-newsletter, is delivered weekly to more than 40,000 recipients.

Our program includes a rich collection of print and online resources:

- With a focus on our local churches, these resources serve as teaching tools, provide guidance and support for vital worship, and call upon church members to grow as disciples and stewards. They tell the story of how the church engages in mission and suggest ways for faithful Christians to live in and respond to the secular culture.
- These resources provide faith-based curricula and other resources that support local church leaders who educate, lead worship and nurture faith formation.
- We offer resources that guide local church leaders to fulfill their voluntary tasks in the congregation.

Theological reflection is central and is done in relationship with all expressions of the church and in many ecumenical settings committed to and remaining open to hearing God's ancient story anew and afresh.

We express our extravagant welcome as we live in covenant so that the church may be one:

- We work with ecumenical and overseas partners.
- We work with the conferences and institutions of the church.
- We work with our partners within the Council for Racial and Ethnic Ministries.

Our administration, financial development and program ministries include the cost of travel, which often connects staff with lay and clergy leaders of the whole church, including those in conference and ecumenical settings.

Included in each of the expense categories named above are costs associated with office space and equipment, maintenance and insurance, as well as office supplies and postage. Also included are common service costs that are allocated to each of the Covenanted Ministries. We cooperate with other ministries so that we can together – and economically – provide for hospitality, archive support, financial services, human resources, information and technology services, mail and copy room/print shop support and the distribution center.

In addition, in a unique and cooperative arrangement, the Office of the General Minister and President also includes the separate functions of Common Services, which is funded proportionately by each of the ministries. Ministries such as the Pension Boards, the Council for Health & Human Services Ministries, the Insurance Boards, the Church Building and Loan Fund and the United Church of Christ Cornerstone Fund participate in certain services offered by Common Services, helping defray the costs allocated to the Covenanted Ministries.

The Staff Ministries of Common Services will require \$1,604,541 this year.

This staff oversees all of the financial functions of the Office of the General Minister and President and the three Covenanted Ministries, handling receipts, paying expenses, keeping records, overseeing the audit and reporting to the church.

Staff also guide efforts in human resources, oversee personnel matters and diversity initiatives.

Staff provides necessary archival support for the past and current records of the church and facilitate in processing mail and duplicating services as well as resource distribution services.

The Infrastructure Support of Common Services will require \$1,821,513 this year.

Outsourced support of our information and technology services is included within this total. This money is also used for managing the computer and telephone systems of the National Setting. Also included are the costs associated with office space and equipment, maintenance, insurance, audit and credit card fees as well as office supplies.

UCC Resources, our warehouse and distribution and fulfillment center, provides support to our members, local churches, conferences and other institutions wishing to order resources produced by the ministry teams throughout the National Setting.

It is important to note that the dollars identified above for Common Services come from the budgets of the Ministries of the church and are allocated amongst the Program, Administration and Fund Development expense categories.

JUSTICE AND WITNESS MINISTRIES

Is called to enable and encourage collaboration among local churches, associations, conferences and national expressions to engage in God's mission nationally and globally by direct action for the integrity of creation, justice, and peace. JWM's mission is to speak and act prophetically through communication, mobilization, leadership training, issues education, public witness and public policy advocacy.

This ministry faithfully used mission support of \$2,829,466 in 2014 and will use \$2,835,957 in 2015. Mission support includes \$1,646,207 given through Our Church's Wider Mission Basic and Special Support in 2014. The projection for 2015 is \$1,561,623.

Our Administration Ministries will require \$756,531 this year.

The Executive Minister (the Rev. M. Linda Jaramillo) is responsible for guiding and leading Justice and Witness Ministries and serves as the Collegium Leader for the Reading Changes Lives Initiative. Neighbors in Need grants are administered out of this office.

Our Program & Grants Ministries will require \$2,079,426 this year.

Our program provides for people of faith to gather and give common voice to specific ways of addressing the elimination of poverty, hunger, racism, classism and sexism.

- We respond to God's intention for dignity and value for all human beings, especially for those who have been disenfranchised, oppressed and excluded.
- We advocate for justice and God's redemptive power in individual lives, in political systems, and in governmental policies at home and around the world.
- Our program works for the common good in public life and for social policies that can restore integrity to human life and creation and that can transform human community to places of peace with strong ties to individuals through the Justice Peace Action Network.

Growing out of our faith and God's call to do justice, our programs offer strong advocacy and direct support for a wide variety of issues.

- We work for economic justice, racial justice, environmental justice, human rights and justice for women, global peacemaking, criminally justice, media ethics, public education and health care for all.
- We engage in a public witness and public policy advocacy on behalf of General Synod.
- We provide human, print and media resources for the church, helping people to connect their Christian faith to specific issues.
- We work with UCC ministry partners to address corporate social responsibility.

Our Justice Leaders Engaging and Developing is a biblically based and theologically grounded training program designed to equip local church leaders with the skills and tools needed to develop, strengthen and sustain justice advocacy ministries in our UCC congregations.

Our program includes support for four Centers of Education and Social Transformation at the UCC Washington D.C. office, Franklinton Center at Bricks in Whitakers, NC, and Pilgrim Firs

in Port Orchard, WA and Silver Lake, CT and provides a grant to support conference staff working directly on immigration issues at our southern borders.

Our administration and program ministries includes the cost of travel, which often connects staff with lay and clergy leaders of the whole church, including those in conference and ecumenical settings.

Included in each of the expense categories named above are costs associated with office space and equipment, maintenance and insurance, as well as office supplies and postage. Also included are common service costs that are allocated to each of the Covenanted Ministries. We cooperate with other ministries so that we can together – and economically – provide for hospitality, archive support, financial services, human resources, information and technology services, mail and copy room/print shop support and the distribution center.

LOCAL CHURCH MINISTRIES

is called to encourage and support the local churches of the United Church of Christ in fulfillment of God's mission, supporting the pilgrimage of the United Church of Christ to be a multiracial/multicultural church, open and affirming, accessible to all. This ministry encourages local churches to shape their life and mission in partnership with one another, with other expressions of the church and with ecumenical and interfaith communities.

This ministry faithfully used mission support of \$4,236,073 in 2014 and will use \$4,139,913 in 2015. Mission support includes \$1,373,810 given through Our Church's Wider Mission Basic and Special Support in 2014. The projection for 2015 is \$590,529.

Our Administration Ministries will require \$842,536 this year.

The Executive Minister (the Rev. J. Bennett Guess) is responsible for guiding and leading Local Church Ministries and serves as the Collegium Leader for the Stillspeaking Worship Institute and Extravagance UCC strategies.

Our Program & Grants Ministries will require \$3,297,377 this year.

Our program includes a wide variety of gatherings of, and resources for, the church:

- Youth come together for exploring faith and life.
- Leaders come together to learn more effective ways of enabling churches to be extravagantly welcoming and vital through worship, evangelism, faith formation and inspiring models of ministry.
- Staff also provides coordination of weekly worship services for visitors and staff as well as the downtown Cleveland community at the Amistad Chapel, and help plan for the enhancement of staff life within the National Setting, and support the work of the Collegium of Officers.

Our programs include many essential services to the church:

- These services provide support for clergy and lay leaders, including chaplains. Helping to prepare leaders open to and prepared for ministry in the present and future church. They provide for services in support of vocational placement, connecting congregations with persons authorized for ministry and support for Committees on Ministry.
- Our program strives to guide churches towards being vital places of worship, learning, advocacy, and service, to teach that evangelism reaching out to others is mission. And we assist congregations making big, bold decisions about their futures.
- This ministry works with conferences of the church to engage in new church development and revisioning of existing churches, providing direct grant support to congregations and the Center for Progressive Renewal to enhance this ministry.
- This ministry provides annual support to the Council for Higher Education member institutions.
- Our program includes record-keeping that has expanded beyond the data collection for the annual yearbook to a new online Data Hub used system wide by Associations, Conferences and the National Setting, with information about our local churches and

ministers and offers greater data analysis about trends and projections for the denomination, our churches and authorized ministers.

Our administration and program ministries includes the cost of travel, which often connects staff with lay and clergy leaders of the whole church, including those in conference and ecumenical settings.

Included in each of the expense categories named above are costs associated with office space and equipment, maintenance and insurance, as well as office supplies and postage. Also included are common service costs that are allocated to each of the Covenanted Ministries. We cooperate with other ministries so that we can together – and economically – provide for hospitality, archive support, financial services, human resources, information and technology services, mail and copy room/print shop support and the distribution center.

WIDER CHURCH MINISTRIES

is called to encourage and support local churches, associations, conferences and national expressions to participate in the global, multiracial/multicultural church, open and affirming, accessible to all. It is called to support United Church of Christ ministries around the world and the nation.

This ministry faithfully used mission support of \$7,845,448 in 2014 and will use \$7,712,720 in 2015. Mission support includes \$2,914,383 given through Our Church's Wider Mission Basic and Special Support in 2014. The projection for 2015 is \$2,874,846.

Our Administration Ministries will require \$1,219,959 this year.

The Executive Minister (the Rev. James Moos) is responsible for guiding and leading Wider Church Ministries and for serving as Co-Executive of Global Ministries.

Administration also includes the cost of board meetings for the Common Global Ministries Board which oversees global partnerships and the sending and receiving of missionaries in a joint venture with the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

Our Financial Development Ministries will require \$177,328 this year.

In cooperation with the Office of Philanthropy and Stewardship, the Executive Minister and other Common Global Ministries staff reach out to the whole church, inviting and receiving gifts that support WCM/CGMB's programs.

Our Program, Grants and Overseas Ministries will require \$6,315,433 this year.

Our program includes significant relationships with and support of more than 270 partner churches and organizations in more than 70 countries around the world:

- Through these connections we respond to health, educational, community and faith needs around the world.
- Partner churches are supported, human needs are met, refugees are resettled, clinics are outfitted and children are sponsored for renewed life.
- Economic, agricultural and community development are supported, along with social services.
- Schools and seminaries are helped and leadership is developed.
- Because of the unique nature of overseas missionaries and our historical understanding of their work, included here in our program efforts is the work of over 120 mission personnel serving in 5 geographic regions.

Our program includes strong advocacy for justice and human rights. In this work we help to meet the needs of partner churches and also inform our own members about vital justice issues which are addressed through a faith perspective.

Through the United Church AIDS Network (UCAN), our program includes work that promotes health and wholeness:

- We work to address the needs resulting from the HIV/AIDS pandemic.
- We advocate for health and welfare concerns in our own country and globally.
- We minister by, for and with persons with disabilities and maintain relationships with the varied health and human service ministries of the church.
- We nurture family life.

Our program offers services to the church:

- We coordinate a large program of voluntary services.
- We offer global and domestic mission education opportunities with special focus on youth and young adults and leadership development.
- We prepare churches to receive missionaries from other parts of the world, support mutual relationships which build up our faith.
- We respond to natural and technological disasters, both domestically and globally.

Our administration, financial development and program ministries includes the cost of travel, which often connects staff with lay and clergy leaders of the whole church, including those in conference and ecumenical settings.

Included in each of the expense categories named above are costs associated with office space and equipment, maintenance and insurance, as well as office supplies and postage. Also included are common service costs that are allocated to each of the Covenanted Ministries. We cooperate with other ministries so that we can together – and economically – provide for hospitality, archive support, financial services, human resources, information and technology services, mail and copy room/print shop support and the distribution center.

THE PENSION BOARDS-UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST

is called to make available a system of employee benefit programs (pension, medical, dental, life and disability plans, as well as assistance programs to meet emergency needs) designed to assist ministers and lay workers in achieving financial security during working and retirement years.

Note: The work related to employee benefit plans, including the necessary staff, is funded by contributions made by church employers on behalf of their employees. This defines the Pension Boards as a membership body and the money used for these purposes is not reflected below. What is reflected below is the assistance ministries which are supported by the whole church through Our Church's Wider Mission Basic Support and the Christmas Fund.

Our Program Ministries require \$2,047,935 this year.

This assistance program, supported by both Basic Support and the Christmas Fund provides direct support to those who have served the Church and are facing financial challenges. Through this ministry, the Church is able to supplement the small pensions of those who retired after years of church services at very low salaries, benefitting those persons and their spouses. Individuals who qualify may receive monthly payments to bring total pension income up to a minimum level set annually by the United Church of Christ Board. In addition to the supplementation of small pensions, assistance is also provided to supplement health benefits of annuitants, Christmas "thank you" checks for annuitants and emergency grants for both actives and annuitants.

UNITED CHURCH FUNDS, INC.

is called to manage investments for local churches, associations, conferences, institutions, national ministries and other entities related to the United Church of Christ so that financial resources can be best used to strengthen God's mission.

Note: Currently United Church Funds receives no money from the church through Our Church's Wider Mission. All of the money it needs for its work comes from modest fees charged against the funds entrusted to its management. Most of the money from fees is used for investment management and marketing and for the support services and governance needed.

OTHER REVENUE SOURCES FOR THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST BOARD

Our Church's Wider Mission both Basic and Special Support, provided for 42.55% of revenue sources (mission support) in 2014. This percentage is expected to increase slightly to 42.57% in 2015 reflecting an increase of Special Support as a percent to total support and a decrease in Basic Support as a percentage of total support.


OCWM Special Support is comprised of four special offerings. Total receipts sent to the national offices changed between 2014 and 2013: Neighbors in Need decreased by \$132,000 or 10.54%; One Great Hour of Sharing decreased by \$54,000 or 2.32%; Strengthen the Church decreased by \$1000 or .41%; and the Christmas Fund decreased by \$49,000 or 3.53%.

The remaining revenues sources represent the following percentages of total support for the Office of the General Minister and President and the Covenanted Ministries:

It is important to emphasize that the National Setting is not alone in experiencing the declines in Our Church's Wider Mission. As basic support dollars have declined, our conference partners have had to begin difficult discussions about their programmatic work, staffing and sustainability.

The chart on the next page provides a graph of total Basic Support at the national and conference levels and the four Special Mission Offerings over the ten year period from 2005 through 2014. The graph shows the trend that has been reported over the past several General Synods. The dollar amounts supporting the graph are provided in the Supplemental Information Section – "Offering Trends-OCWM Basic Support and Special Mission Offerings". According to the *Fall 2014 United Church of Christ Statistical Profile* published by the Center for Analytics, Research and Data, national basic support has decreased from approximately \$.01 of every \$1.00 of local church expense in 2003 to less than \$.01 in 2013.



Staff of the National Setting is not immune to the realities of the decline in both basic support and the special mission offerings. Programs continue to be reviewed with a goal of efficiency and excellence as staff collaborate between and amongst themselves to support the Church's emphasis on continuing testament, extravagant welcome and changing lives. Faithful stewardship of our resources, and care for the future viability of the National Setting, are high priorities.

The work of the Task Force on Giving, as stated earlier in this report will examine the covenant of giving across the various expressions of the church in order to ensure the discovery, implementation and utilization of a more effective and efficient development program and inform the future direction of the church's pattern of giving. This holistic approach by the Task Force may eventually benefit not only the National Setting of the church, but our conferences, associations, local churches and other partners in ministry and education.

In addition, the Office of Philanthropy and Stewardship will support the United Church of Christ Board's budget planning process by using predictive modeling to create a reliable giving forecast. Beginning in 2016, for the first time, the United Church of Christ Board's budget will integrate a fundraising goal as projected charitable income.

Financial challenges in all settings of the United Church of Christ continue but significant opportunities for partnerships and collaboration present themselves as well.

Provided below are the two actions that General Synod will be asked to consider and vote upon:

PROPOSED NATIONAL BASIC SUPPORT PAY OUT BASE FOR 2016 and 2017

Each biennium, a National Basic Support (NBS) pay out base is recommended by the United Church of Christ Board and taken to General Synod for adoption. The base establishes the amount used to calculate the NBS to be paid out. Actual NBS for 2014 was \$6.476 million; the original projection as adopted by General Synod in 2013 was \$6.304 million for 2014 and \$6.017 million for 2015. The 2015 budget was based on projected receipts of \$6.190 million as the decline in national basic support is beginning to decrease on an annual basis.

Due to the continued trend in declining dollars and adjusted sharing ratios between the Conferences and the National Setting, the United Church of Christ Board is recommending that the General Synod adopt a National Basic Support Allocation base of \$6.007 million and \$5.785 million for the budget years 2016 and 2017.

PROPOSED NATIONAL BASIC SUPPORT ANNUAL ALLOCATION FOR 2016/2017

Each year, the percentage allocation of OCWM National Basic Support is recommended by the United Church of Christ Board. General Synod will be asked to delegate the determination of the percentage allocation for OCWM National Basic Support for 2016 and 2017 to the United Church of Christ Board.

The current percentages for the budget year 2015 are: Office of the General Minister and President 67.88%; Justice and Witness Ministries 13.11%; Local Church Ministries 5.72%; Wider Church Ministries 7.67% and the Pension Boards 5.62%.
