

1 **THE RIGHT OF LGBT PARENTS TO ADOPT AND RAISE CHILDREN**
2 **A Resolution of Witness**

3
4 **Submitted by the United Church of Christ Coalition for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and**
5 **Transgender Concerns.**

6
7 **SUMMARY**
8

9 Today more than 460,000 children in the United States live in group or foster homes. Nearly
10 one-fourth of that number have waited five or more years for adoption: many never find adoptive
11 parents, and continue to live in the foster care system until they become adults. Every year,
12 nearly 20,000 of these children leave the system when they turn 18—without the support of an
13 adoptive family, and facing an uncertain future.

14
15 A growing sign of hope is the willingness of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT)
16 couples to adopt children who otherwise might be unable to find adoptive parents. According to
17 the 2000 census, 65,500 adopted children are living in LGBT households, and the number
18 continues to grow. Both the American Psychological Association and American Medical
19 Association support the right of LGBT couples to adopt children.

20
21 Many states, however, do not allow co-parent adoption by LGBT couples. In these families, if
22 the legally recognized parent dies, the surviving parent may have no right to care for the child.
23 Moreover, powerful lobbies are campaigning in many states to deprive LGBT couples of even
24 the right to single-parent adoption.

25
26 This resolution calls upon General Synod to support the right of LGBT parents to adopt children, and
27 encourages all settings of the church to defend the LGBT community when their families are threatened
28 by campaigns to limit or eliminate their parental rights.

30 **BIBLICAL AND THEOLOGICAL RATIONALE**
31

32 The care and nurture of children is a moral responsibility for families, the church and the
33 community. Care for orphaned children is the very definition of "religion that is pure and
34 undefiled before God" (James 1:27). The protection of children from harm is Christ's
35 commandment, for "whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me" (Matthew
36 18:5), and "it is not the will of your Father in heaven that one of these little ones should be lost"
37 (Matthew 18:14).

39 **RESOLUTION**

41 WHEREAS, tens of thousands of children in the United States have little hope of adoption, and
42 are moved from foster home to foster home until they finally age out of the system; and

43
44 WHEREAS, many lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) individuals and couples are
45 willing and able to provide the stability, nurture and love that all children need in order to grow
46 into emotionally healthy adults; and

48 WHEREAS, both the American Psychological Association and the American Medical
49 Association have determined that gender identity and sexual orientation do not hinder a person's
50 capacity to be a good parent; and

51
52 WHEREAS, a child whose primary legal parent dies or is incapacitated may in many
53 jurisdictions be removed from the second parent and become a ward of the state; and

54
55 WHEREAS, co-parent adoption entitles children to essential benefits, including Social Security,
56 child support, health insurance, inheritance rights and a continuing relationship with one parent
57 in the event of the separation or death of the other parent; and

58
59 WHEREAS, LGBT children in the foster-care system need responsible and supportive role
60 models;

61
62 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Twenty-eighth General Synod of the United Church
63 of Christ, call on the United Church of Christ in all of its settings to defend the rights of all
64 children to have loving parents without regard to sexual orientation or gender expression, and to
65 recognize a family to be any loving, nurturing, ethical relationship between a child and one or
66 more parents; and

68 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Twenty-eighth General Synod of the United Church of
69 Christ calls on all states to evaluate prospective adoptive parents solely on the basis of their
70 individual character and ability to parent, not on their sexual orientation or gender identity, and
71 to grant second-parent or joint adoptions when it is in the child's best interests; and

73 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Twenty-eighth General Synod of the United Church of
74 Christ requests Justice and Witness Ministries to communicate this resolution to local, state and
75 national legislators, urging them to support the rights of all children to have a loving parent or
76 parents without regard to the parent's sexual orientation or gender identity.

78 **FUNDING**

80 Funding for the implementation of this resolution will be made in accordance with the overall
81 mandates of the affected agencies and the funds available.

83 **IMPLEMENTATION**

85 Justice and Witness Ministries is requested to implement this resolution.
